A posty of an French Horfe, who, it feems, had got noof this Vessel, and the way they cook to effect it was, That three of their company leaving their Horses, should go and presend to take passage in the said Vefsel, and having made themselves Masters of it, should earry it to a place where the party would meet them; it happened that when they came to the Veffel, the Jews were all ashore, and two Men and a Boy onely on board, they readily took in these three pretended Passengers, whose design they very much suspected, and leaving the Jews behind them, they put off, but were not gone a quarter of a Mile, but having yer more reason to sufpect that their Passengers had some ill intention against them; they took the opportunity to ild themselves of two of them, by throwing them into the water, where they were drowned, as they likewise afterwardsserved the other, though he made some resistance, yet to no purpose, which done, they came back to the place where they left the Jews, and gave them an account of what had pail.

Hamburg, March 6. The Suedes of Stade have Been within these sew days abroad in several Vessels, and have plundered and burnt two Danish Villages on the Elbes they likewise threatned Altena, 2 small Town about a quarter of a Mile from hence, but hitherto they have not effected their purpole. It is reported there, as if there fill remained forme difference between The Confederates about the sharing their Conquests upon the Suedes; however it seems they have sufficiently adjusted the siege of Stade, for we are assured that they will now take it in hand very suddenly, and that the Duke of Hanouer will send some of his Troops to his Brother the Duke of Zell, on this occasion. hear that the King of Denmark has at prefent a Body of about 10000 Men near Eifenore, and that several Regiments are fent for from W is mar to make up the said Body to 15 or 16000, and then it's faid fomething will be attempted upon the Suedes, who are not wanting to

Bruffets, March 10. The French make great preparazions on all fides of us, in order to their coming into the Field very speedily, and have cut down a Wood, to make a way for their Army to march between Chievre and Huyne; in the mean timeour Go-Vernor-General the Duke de Villa Hermofa is not wanring to reinforce the Garifons of Ipres, and other places which the French feem chiefly to have an eye upon; and at the same time, has sent to the Prince of Orange, to give him an account of the Enemies forwardness, and to pray his Highness to hasten into the Field; and we are affured, that in the mean time four Dutch Regiments, making 4000 Men, are marching towards these Countreys, to help us to make up our Garifons in all our places. Our Letters from Liege Tay for certain, that the French are about demolishing the Caseles of Huj and Dinant; we are here in great expectation of the Spanish Ordinary, which we hope will bring us the news of the arrival of the Galions. till when We cannot expect the supplies from Madrid, which have to long been promifed us, and which we begin very much to want.

Hague, March 10. We are told, that while the ships Intended for the reinforcement of Lieutenant Admiral ele Ruyter are fitting out here, orders will be fent to the Sieur de Ruyter his son, who is at present with a Squadron of Men of War in the Mediterranean to Convoy four Merchant ships, to join his Father, who it's thought -will then be furnciently in a condition to attempt something upon the French, in order to the reducing of Mef- the Inner Temple.

The Raedt Pentioner Fagel is gone towards Gelderland, to receive the Fore of Schencken Scans , which has been in the hands of the Elector of Brandenhurgh, fince it was quitted by the French, and is now agreed to be reflored to this State. This afternoon his Highness is gone to Soestdike, from whence he will makes hep to visit the faid Fortrels. At Amsterdam are fitting out by the Danish Ministers a great many small Boars, who are to be employed for the blocking up the River Elbe, that is to keep all suctors from being carried to Stade by water. The 13 Men of War defigned for the Baltick, are very much haftened; it is still faid, that the Steur Tromp is to command the Danish Fleer there this next Summer.

Parts, March 11. The Troops of the King's Houshold have orders to be ready to march on the 25 inflant; and it's faid his Majefty will begin his pourney foon after Easters. The Duke de Coqui has taken passifion of his Government of this City, which has been done with much ceremony. From Sicily we hear, that part of the Frenth Fleet is returned from Messian, towards Provence, to convoy the new supply that will be fieldent ready to fail from Thousand and Messian. by ready to fail from Thoulen and Marfailes. From Flanders we have nothing new, but it's probable it will not be long cre there will be more matter to write of, for it's believed that before the end of this Month, our Forces will be in the Field, and perhaps before fome of the Enemies places

Ditto. On Monday next it's faid the Mareschal de Montmorency will part hence for Alfatia, to give the necessary orders for the bringing the Army he is to sommand in those quarters into the the Field, and about 10 or 14 days hence the Mareschal de Crequi will like wife part for Flanders, to prepare things there again the Kings arrival. The news here is, that the Count Southes will be employed again this Campagne, and that he will command a flying Armyon the Mefelle; as the Marefelfal de Rochefors will do on our fide. Duke de Falver, son to the Duke of Orleans, is faid en be very ill. Our Letters from Brifae tell us, shat befides the taking Prisoners the Sieur Monstas, and the Sieur de la Brosse by the Imperialists, the loss on our fide was very incomfiderable, in the action shat hape pened lately near Wulkirke.
