**W**HEREAS the Names of many of the Officers serving in the respective Regiments and Battalions of Militia within the several Counties in England and Wales, have been frequently returned by the Judges in the List of Persons proper to be appointed Sheriffs, notwithstanding such Officers are by Law exempted from serving the Office of Sheriff during the Time of their Service in the Militia: And whereas the Impropriety of such Returns has proceeded from the Want of Information being given to the Judges of the Names of the several Officers serving in the Militia, from whence many Inconveniencies have arisen: His Majesty, in order to prevent the like happening for the future, is pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby to Require and Command, that the respective Lieutenants of the several Counties in England and Wales, where the Militia has been raised and embodied, do cause Lists to be made every Year of the Names and Places of Residence of the Officers serving in the Militia within the respective Counties, and cause the said Lists to be delivered into the Hands of the Clerk of Assize, in order to be laid before the Judges at the Time of holding the Summer Assize, that Care may be taken, for the Time to come, not to insert the Names of any such Officers on the Roll of Persons to be proposed to His Majesty as proper to serve the Office of Sheriff.

*Moscow, June 8.* After a Stay of three Days the Empress left Yeroslaff, and arrived at Costroma the 16th. The 20th she came to Niseknoy, Novogorod, and Casan, being only 360 Weists distant from this last Place. She intends to go as far as that City, and to return to Moscow by the 15th Instant. Her Imperial Majesty was received every-where with all possible Marks of Duty and Gratitude for her constant Care to render her Subjects happy; whose

Eyes were full of Tears of Joy at the Sight of a Sovereign so worthy to be beloved.

*Florence, June 27.* In the last Week a fourth Convoy arrived at Civita Vecchia, from St. Sebastian and the Petrol, with 203 Jesuits on Board, escorted by a Spanish Ship of War of 64 Guns. They were refused Admittance, and the Wind being high, the Vessels were driven towards Porto S. Stefano, where the third Convoy still remained.

On Sunday a Te Deum was sung in the Chapel of the Palace, for the Re establishment of the Empress Queen's Health. The Court was in Great Gala that Day, and the Foreign Ministers altogether complimented the Great Duke and Dutchess on this Occasion. On the 24th likewise the Mourning was again laid aside, it being the Festival of St. John, the Tutelar Saint of Florence, when the Great Duke, according to annual Custom, received the Homage of the principal Cities and Towns of the Great Dutchy.

*Genoa, June 27.* This Afternoon the Ceremony of Crowning the Doge was performed as usual; and To-morrow the Doge gives a great Entertainment to the Nobility of both Sexes.

*Dresden, June 28.* Princess Christina, the Administrator's Sister, arrived from France on Wednesday Evening last. Her Serene Highness intends, it is said, to make some Stay here. She has lately been indisposed with an Erysipelus in her Leg, but is at present much better.

An Express arrived here this Week from Vienna, with Advice, that the Small-Pox had appeared on Prince Albert of Saxony. Though it was not of the best Sort, yet the Eruption being unattended with dangerous Symptoms, the Physicians made no Doubt of the Prince's getting well over it.

Count Fleming lies still at the Point of Death, and there is no Hope of his Recovery.

*Hamburgh, July 3.* On the 30th past, about Half an Hour after Five o'Clock, the King of Denmark arrived in perfect Health at Altona; and, in passing over a little Part of the Territory of this Republick, was saluted by a Discharge of 30 Pieces of Cannon from the Ramparts of this City. Prince Frederick of Hesse was in his Majesty's Coach. The next Day his Danish Majesty

Majesty had a full Court, when all the Foreign Ministers had the Honour to be presented to him, as were many of the Nobility settled in this Neighbourhood. In the Evening his Majesty came to the Play, and afterwards returned to Altona. Yesterday there was a Court again: And To-day his Majesty does Baron Schimmelmann the Honour to dine at his House, and will afterwards go to the Play.

All the Members of the Council have followed his Danish Majesty except Count Daneskjoeld, who was indisposed at Sleswick, and is going, for a little While, to his Country-Seat for the Benefit of the Air.

**Hamburgh, July 7.** On Saturday the King of Denmark came to Town in the Forenoon, and had a Party of Pleasure upon the Alster. As soon as his Majesty entered his Barge, which was about One o'Clock, a Royal Salute was given by the Cannon of the Ramparts, and the same was repeated at his Return in the Evening about Seven o'Clock. The City is in the Form of an Amphitheatre at the Place where his Majesty embarked, and the Houses surrounding a most beautiful large Basin of Water, ornamented with the publick Walks, were crowded with Barges; the Whole, together with the immense Number of Spectators, formed a most agreeable Sight; at which his Danish Majesty was pleased to express his Satisfaction. On Sunday the Court went into Mourning for the Empress of Germany. In the Morning there was a Levec, and in the Afternoon his Danish Majesty entered the City on Horse-back, attended by all the Great Officers of State, preceded by the Dragoons of the Republick, and followed by a large Detachment of his own. After passing through the Chief Streets, his Majesty went round Part of the Ramparts, which were likewise full of Spectators, and returned in the same Manner to Altona, under a Discharge of our Cannon. The Cavalcade was very fine, as all the King's Household were in embroidered Uniforms. Yesterday Evening his Danish Majesty came to Town incognito, and was at the Masquerade, where he staid till past Two o'Clock. To-day his Majesty will have a very full Court, it being the last Time we shall have the Honor to pay our Respects to him, as his Majesty will rest To-morrow; and set out on Thursday for Travendahl.
