The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS the Names of many of the Officers serving in the respective Regiments and Battalions of Militia within the several Counties in England and Wales, have been frequently returned by the Judges in the List of Persons proper to be appointed Sheriffs, notwithstanding such Officers are by Law exempted from serving the Office of Sheriff during the Time of their Service in the Militia: And whereas the Impropriety of such Returns has proceeded from the Want of Information being given to the Judges of the Names of the several Officers serving in the Militia, from whence many Inconveniencies have arisen: His Majesty, in order to prevent the like happening for the future, is pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby to Require and Command, that the respective Lieutenants of the several Counties in England and Wales, where the Militia has been raised and embodied, do cause Lists to be made every Year of the Names and Places of Residence of the Officers serving in the Militia within the respective Counties, and cause the said Lists to be delivered into the Hands of the Clerk of Assize, in order to be laid before the Judges at the Time of holding the Summer Assize, that Care may be taken, for the Time to come, not to insert the Names of any such Officers on the Roll of Persons to be proposed to His Majesty as proper to serve the Office of Sheriff.

**H**IS Majesty having signified His Pleasure to my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that the embroidered Uniform Cloathing appointed to be worn by Flag Officers, and the Full-Dress Uniform Cloathing appointed to be worn by Captains, Commanders, and Lieutenants of His Majesty's Fleet, be discontinued; that the Frock Uniform Cloathing appointed to be worn by the said Officers, be altered as mentioned at the Foot hereof; and that for the Future no other Military Uniform Cloathing than the Frock Uniform, altered as aforesaid, be worn by the said Officers, excepting such as have already provided themselves with Uniform Cloathing according to the Establish-

ment of 1748, who are on that Account allowed to wear the same until the 4th of June next: Their Lordships do hereby give Notice thereof to all Flag Officers, Captains, Commanders, and Lieutenants of His Majesty's Fleet, and direct and require them respectively to conform strictly thereto.

*Alterations in the Uniform Cloathing of the Flag and other Officers of His Majesty's Fleet.*

The Admirals Frocks to have narrow Lappels down to the Waist; small Boot Cuffs; a single Lace instead of treble Lace down the Side Skirts; to be laced with a plain Mousquetaire Lace, agreeable to the Pattern lodged at the Navy Office, and in all other Respects to be the same as are now worn.

The Captains and Commanders Frocks to have narrow Lappels down to the Waist, and in all other Respects to continue as they are now worn.

The Lieutenants Frocks to have narrow Lappels down to the Waist, Slash Cuffs like the Commanders (without Lace) instead of Roll Cuffs, and in all other Respects to remain as they are now worn.

*Madrid, June 29.* His Catholick Majesty and all the Royal Family removed from Aranjuez to their Town Residence on the Evening of the 27th.

*Turin, July 4.* His Sardinian Majesty, whose Health seems perfectly established during the short Stay he made at the Venerie, is returned to Town with the Royal Family.

*Florence, July 4.* Dispositions are making with great Diligence in the Great Duke's Palace, for the Reception both of the Emperor and the future Queen of Naples in the Autumn.

*Hamburg, July 10.* Yesterday Morning passed under the Walls of this City, in his Way to Travendahl, a Palace belonging formerly to the Duke of Piöen, where that Monarch proposes to reside for Eight Days. Before the King's Departure he was pleased to express himself satisfied with the Pains the City had taken to contribute to his Amusement, and honored their Deputies with handsome Presents of Gold and Enamelled Snuff Boxes.

*Brussels, July 14.* On Friday last their Royal and Serene Highnesses the Prince and Princess and young Prince of Brunswick arrived here in perfect Health. They were received with

with all the Honours that possibly could be shewn to such Illustrious Personages. There was a Company of Grenadiers with the Colours to receive them where they lodged, and the Equipages of the Court ready to attend them. In the Evening they went to the Comedy.

In an Hour after their Arrival all the Nobility in Town went to pay their Court to them; and an Express having been sent to his Royal Highness Prince Charles, informing him of their Arrival, he immediately came to Town, and went directly to the Pl. House to meet them, and expressed the greatest Joy and Pleasure in having the Honour of seeing them at Brussels.

The next Day their Royal and Serene Highnesses went to Traveuren to dine with Prince Charles, escorted by his Royal Highness's Hussars; and on their Arrival Prince Charles handed her Royal Highness out of the Coach, and conducted her into his Apartments.

In the Evening his Royal Highness the Duke of Ulster, and went to the Comedy, where he was received by Prince Charles with all the Marks of Joy and Affection.

On the 13th, in the Morning, his Serene Highness the Prince of Brunswick set off early to visit the Fortifications of Namur, and proposed to meet her Royal Highness, in the Evening, at St. Trone, and then to proceed for Aix-la-Chapelle, where they will remain a Day or two, and then go on to Hanover. About Twelve o'Clock the same Day her Royal Highness left Brussels. Soon after which his Royal Highness the Duke of York set out for Traveuren, and in the Evening returned to Town, and, after supping at Count Cobentzel's, left this Place for Mons.

Dublin, July 10, 1767.
