The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act for allowing the Importation of Wheat and Wheat Flour from His Majesty's Colonies in America into this Kingdom, for a limited Time, free of Duty," It is enacted that it shall and may be lawful to and for any of His Majesty's Subjects to import into Great Britain, in any Ship or Vessel navigated according to Law, at any Time or Times before the first Day of August One Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty-seven; any Wheat or Wheat Flour from any of His Majesty's Colonies in America, without the Payment of any Subsidy, Custom, Duty or Imposition whatsoever, in the Manner therein mentioned. And whereas by another Act passed in the said Session of Parliament, entitled, "An Act for granting to His Majesty a certain Sum of Money out of the Sinking Fund, and for applying certain Monies therein mentioned, for the Service of the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty-seven; and for further appropriating the Supplies granted in this Session of Parliament; for carrying to the Aggregate Fund a Sum of Money which hath arisen by the Two-sevenths Excise; for empowering His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to permit the Importation of any Sort of Corn or Grain, Duty Free, into this Kingdom, for a longer Time than is permitted by any Act of this Session of Parliament; and for obviating Doubts, in relation to the Meeting of Commissioners for putting in Execution an Act of this Session for granting an Aid to his Majesty by a Land Tax;" after reciting that it might be expedient, during the Recess of Parliament, to permit the Free Importation of the said Articles into this Kingdom beyond the Time limited by the said Act for the Free Importation thereof; It is enacted, amongst other Things, that it shall and may be lawful to and for His Majesty, from Time to Time, during the next Recess of Parliament, (whenever it shall appear expedient to His Majesty so to do) by His Royal Proclamation to be issued by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, or by his Order in

Council to be published in the London Gazette, to permit the Free Importation of the Articles aforesaid from any Parts or Places in His Majesty's Dominions in America, for any Time or Times until the first Day of February One Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty-eight: And whereas it appears to His Majesty to be expedient at this Time, that the Free Importation of Wheat and Wheat Flour from any Parts or Places in His Majesty's Dominions in America should be further continued; His Majesty doth therefore hereby Order, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, that the Free Importation into Great Britain of Wheat and Wheat Flour by any of His Majesty's Subjects be permitted from any Parts or Places in His Majesty's Dominions in America, in any Ship or Vessel navigated according to Law, from the Expiration of the Time limited for the Importation thereof by the first mentioned Act, until the First Day of February, 1768, under the Regulations and in the Manner mentioned and contained in the said recited Acts; of which all Persons concerned are hereby required to take Notice and govern themselves accordingly.

HIS Majesty having signified His Pleasure to my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that the embroidered Uniform Cloathing appointed to be worn by Flag Officers, and the Full-Dress Uniform Cloathing appointed to be worn by Captains, Commanders, and Lieutenants of His Majesty's Fleet, be discontinued; that the Frock Uniform Cloathing appointed also to be worn by the said Officers, be altered as mentioned at the Foot hereof; and that for the Future no other Military Uniform Cloathing than the Frock Uniform, altered as aforesaid, be worn by the said Officers, excepting such as have already provided themselves with uniform



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Uniform Cloathing according to the Establishment of 1748, who are on that Account allowed to wear the same until the 4th of June next: Their Lordships do hereby give Notice thereof to all Flag Officers, Captains, Commanders, and Lieutenants of His Majesty's Fleet; and direct and require them respectively to conform strictly thereto.

Alterations in the Uniform Cloathing of the Flag and other Officers of His Majesty's Fleet.

The Admirals Frocks to have narrow Lappels down to the Waist; small Boot Cuffs; a single Lace instead of treble Lace down the Side Skirts; to be laced with a plain Mousquetaire Lace, agreeable to the Pattern lodged at the Navy Office, and in all other Respects to be the same as are now worn.

The Captains and Commanders Frocks to have narrow Lappels down to the Waist, and in all other Respects to continue as they are now worn.

The Lieutenants Frocks to have narrow Lappels down to the Waist, Slash Cuffs like the Commanders (without Lace) instead of Roll Cuffs, and in all other Respects to remain as they are now worn.
