HE 20th instant arrived here Mr. Skelton Envoy. Extraordinary from His Majesty of Great Britain to the Emperor, to Negotiate certain matters relating to a General Peace: But it is said that he has received directions from England to remain here till farther The Dyet hath finally resolved to prohibit sche bringing in of all French Manufactures into the Empire, and at present they are consulting how To have their resolution in this matter most effectually executed. Our last Lecters from Vienna told us, that the Empress continues still very much indisposed, which -occasions much crouble at that Court: That General -Monteckeuli would not part thence, till towards the Partition of the next month, and that it was believed that the Emperor would give Count So tokes forte command this Campagne, he having neitely justified him-folf of whatever had been objected against him relating no his conduct in the Campagne of 1674. in Flun-

Vienna, March 1. This week was celebrated here the Birth-day of the Emp-ess Dowager, but not with that Solemnity as usually, because of the indisposition of the Empress, who as she does not grow worse, so meads very li the "We are told that shooo Crowns have been ie ed hither from spain, of which 20000 are to be paid to the Elector of rever, to make good to him in some measure the damage he hach suffered by the Encach, and the remaining 30000 are in part of he Sublidy payable by Spain to this Court Preparations are making at Newfludt for the reception there of the Queen Dowager of Poland, for which reason the Prince of Eurstemberg siath been removed from thence to the Castleat Brun, however it's scared the indisposition of the Empress may hinder the interview that was incended to be held the next month between their Imperial Mije-Ries, and the Queen Dowager at Newstadt. It is said that the Confederates have finally agreed, that after the conclusion of the War, Garetstadt shall be demolished, but that in the mean time it shall remain in the condition it now is in. We do not yet hear any thing of the departure of the Emperors Plenipotentiaries from honce for Nimeguen.

Strasburgh, March & Yesterday in the evening we received advice, that the French are preparing to pass the Rhine again, and to make an incursion into the Countrey of Briscouia, though it's probable they may be prevented by the Imperialists, who are drawing out of their Winter-quarters towards the Rhie e, to observe them. The Imperial parties are frequently abroad, and rendet the commissive between as and the French very unsecure; the other day an Imperial party took between Stolhouen and Ruster, a Wagon, in which they found three small Batrels, and in each yooo Growns, going from hence to Philipsburgh: though we hear that several Inhabitants of this City claim the said monies, and say it was designed to spire. We expect the Sieur Verjus, who is to reside here on the part of Grande. On Woonday last the Duke of Lorrain went from his quarter, to that of the

Prince of Baden, General of the Imperial Artillery, at Estingen; and the next day his Highness, the Prince of Baden, and General Fermuller, parted for Lauterburgh, to visit the Fortifications there, which they tound in a very good posture; and the 4th instant, General Vermuller returned to his quarters in the Dutchy of Wirtenham.

Cologne, March rd. The Duke of Newburgh process with his Levies, intending to raife a Body of 7000 Foot, 1000 Horse, and 500 Dragoons; we cannot yet fay for what fervice they are defigned, farther than to fecure his Countries from the vexations they have been subject to since the War., The Garifon of Mayence is reinforced with 1500 imperialists, and people work there with great application on the new Portifications that are railing, for the greater security of that City, upon which it is very much apprehended the French have tome defign. Our Letters from Manheim arrived this morning, give us an account, that the Commander of Fretten in the Palarina'e, understanding that a party of the Garison of Philipsburgh, which had been abroad to gather Contributions, was fetutuing home with a great deal of Boory and that they were to pass his Neighborhood, fent out some Troops, who fell upon the French, and totally fouted them, and eafed them of their Booty. From Alfatia they write, that the French are againdrawing 3 of 4000 men together, with intention to repass the Rhine and to revenge the loss they lately fusfered at Buckholts, by pillaging the whole Countrey of Brifg via. On the other fide, the Imperial parties are likewife abroad; it is faid one of them took the last week a Wagon which was laden with a very confiderable Sum of French monies going from Strasburgh to Phi-

Berlin, March & Preparations are making for another incursion into Pomeren, and to make some farther progress there. Our Advices tell us, That the Suedes will have a good Army this Summer in these parts, they expecting very considerable reinforcements from Sueden, Finland, &c.

Hamburgh, March 9. The Suedes of Stade having of late been frequently abroad, and plundered and burnt one or two Villages belonging to the Danes; these last, to secure themselves against the like Insults for the suture, fitted out at Altena a Merchantman of considerable burthen to serve for a Man of War, putting in her 36 pieces of Cannon, and Men and other Arms and Provisions proportionable. The 6th inst nt, this Man of War failedfrom Attend, attended with another of & Guns, and several other smaller Vessels and, as we hear, they have taken their station be ore the River winge, which makes the Communication between Stade and the Elbe, so that by this means the sucdes will be blocked up on the side of the water, if they do not remove the Danes from their station, as it's said they are preparing to do. We have here the ill news, that four of our Merchantmen coming from Spain, have been arrested at Gluckstadt, by order of the King of Denmark, for what reason we cannot learns Our Merchants and their Effects are still under Arrest at Maegdeburg, the Deputies our Magistrates sent on this Subject to the Elector of Brandenburgh, not having been able to effect any thing; and we hear that the Bishop of Munster has likewise caused a Declaration to be issued against this City, because of the assistance that hath, as is said, been privately sent from hence to the Suedes.

Liege, March 10. The French of Maestricht have commanded all the Boors of that Neighborhood to bring their Forage thither, and great quantities of Hay are likewise sent aduly from hence to Maestricht. There is not as yet any appearance of the French quitting our Cittadel, though it's certainly said that the Cattle of Huy will be wholly de molithed in a day or two. Preparations are making at Maestricht to lodge 8 or 10000 men, so that it seems this Countrey must till be the seat of the War.

Brussels, March 13. We are told that by the last Spanilli Ordinary, his Excellency received Bills of Exchange from Madrid for 300 000 Crowns more, to be employed for the service of these Countries. The French begin to give us great Alarms, and we expect every day to hear that they have invested Ipres, or some of our Frontier places; they have already a Body of 12000 Men together near Tournay, and are drawing more Forces from other parts. It is faid that they have built at Tournay fix small Frigats, each of which to carry six Guns, and 400 Men, to be employed for the artacking any Town by water, and are fo contrived, that they can be carried over Land upon wheels. We are told, that feveral Companies of Dutch Foot are already arrived at Malines, and at Ghent, and more are to follow, in all to or 12000 men, which are to be put into our feveral places, till such time as the Prince of Orange is ready to take the Field, when he will withdraw them again. Some dayes fince we had advice', That the Governor of Aeth had commanded all the Peafines of the Neighbouring Villages to repair with their Wagons and Carts on the 15 of the next month to Aeth, with a promise that in consideration thereof, parr of their Contributions should be a-The 10 instant, a party of the Garison of Namur plundered and burnt the Abby of Afne in the Countrey of Liege, where the French had made great provision of Oats, Straw, and Hay; and it's said that the Governor of Charlesoy having been abroad near Chaftelet, escaped narrowly, being taken Prisoner by another of our parties. The Sieur Fariau is parted hence for Treves, of which City he is made Governor.

Amsterdam, March 13. His Highness is gone from Soefidike to Scheneken Seans, where he will meet the Raedt Pentionary Fagel. We have advice from Germamy, That the Elector of Bavaria is agreed with the Imperial Ministers about the quarters taken in his Countries by the Troops of the Emperor. All our Letters from Flanders affure us, that the French will now very speedily begin the Campagne, and that preparations were making at Courseay for the reception of the Most Christian King, who is expected there the beginning of the next month. Some Merchants here pretend to have Letters from Sicily, which give a much more advantageous account for us of the last Fight between the Lieutenant Admiral de Ruyter and the French, in which they fay the latter had 1500 men killed and woun-Hed.

Hague, Marth 13. In the absence of the Prince of Orange (who is expected back in a day or two) nothing of moment passes here. His Highness, before his going out of Town, was present in a Conference held by the Ministers of the respective Allies for the concerting the operations of the approaching Campagne, though we do

not hear that any thing was finally concluded, it being deferred till the return of the Marquis de Grana from Bruffels, whicher he is gone to confer with the Duke de Villa Hermofa on the same subject. The States General have refolved to depute two persons to each of the Provinces which are wanting in the payment of their Quota's of the general charge of the War, to press them to cause the faid menies to be paid into the Generality forthwith, that so those many complaints may be taken off which are now made as well by the Soldiers as others, who have not been paid through the deficiency of the faid Provinces. The Sieur Tromp will in few dayes part hence for Copenhagen, being, as we have already told you, to command the Danish Fleet in the Bastich this Summer; the Sieur Cornelis Eversz is to be Vice-admiral of the faid Fleet, and to command the 15 Men of War that are fitting out by this State, to be joined with those of Denmark. From Copenhagen they write, that they had newsthere, that 8000 Suedes lay ready at Colmar, to be Transported for Pemeren, so soon as the weather would permit. We are told that here is preparing a great number of scaling Ladders.

Paris, March 15. It is said at Court, that the King has put off his journey till the 15 of the next month but that in the mean time the General Officers will take their way towards Flanders and Germany, to give the necessary orders. The 5th instant, the Duke de Grequi was received in the Parliament as Governour of this City, which was performed with much folemnity. From Philipsburgh they write, That that Garifon continues its incursions into the Neighbouring Countries with great success, having lately plundered and burnt two small Towns or Bourgs in the Palatinate, for having wanted to pay their Contributions, as likewise the Town of Berg-Zaberne belonging to the Duke of Deux Ponts. We are told that the King has accepted the Expedient proposed by His Majesty of Great Britain, for the removing the difficulties arisen in the matter of the Passports.
