AT the Court at *St. James's*, the 24th Day of July, 1767,

P R E S E N T,
The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, intitled, "An Act for allowing the Importation of Wheat and Wheat Flour from His Majesty's Colonies in America into this Kingdom, for a limited Time, free of Duty," It is enacted that it shall and may be lawful to and for any of his Majesty's Subjects to import into Great Britain, in any Ship or Vessel navigated according to Law, at any Time or Times before the first Day of August One Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty-seven, any Wheat or Wheat Flour from any of His Majesty's Colonies in America, without the Payment of any Subsidy, Custom, Duty or Imposition whatsoever, in the Manner therein mentioned. And whereas by another Act passed in the said Session of Parliament, entitled, "An Act for granting to His Majesty a certain Sum of Money out of the Sinking Fund, and for applying certain Monies therein mentioned, for the Service of the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty-seven; and for further appropriating the Supplies granted in this Session of Parliament; for carrying to the Aggregate Fund a Sum of Money which hath arisen by the Two-sevenths Excise; for empowering His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to permit the Importation of any Sort of Corn or Grain, Duty Free, into this Kingdom, for a longer Time than is permitted by any Act of this Session of Parliament; and for obviating Doubts, in relation to the Meeting of Commissioners for putting in Execution an Act of this Session for granting an Aid to his Majesty by a Land Tax;" after reciting that it might be expedient, during the Recess of Parliament, to permit the Free Importation of the said Articles into this Kingdom beyond the Time limited by the said Act for the Free Importation thereof; It is enacted, amongst other Things, that it shall and may be lawful to and for His Majesty, from Time to Time, during the next Recess of Parliament, (whenever it shall appear expedient to His Majesty so to do) by His Royal Proclamation to be issued by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, or by his Order in Council to be published in the London Gazette, to permit the Free Importation of the Articles aforesaid from any Parts or Places in His Ma-

jefty's Dominions in America, for any Time or Times until the first Day of February One Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty-eight: And whereas it appears to His Majesty to be expedient at this Time, that the Free Importation of Wheat and Wheat Flour from any Parts or Places in His Majesty's Dominions in America should be further continued; His Majesty doth therefore hereby Order, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, that the Free Importation into Great Britain of Wheat and Wheat Flour by any of His Majesty's Subjects be permitted from any Parts or Places in His Majesty's Dominions in America, in any Ship or Vessel navigated according to Law, from the Expiration of the Time limited for the Importation thereof by the first mentioned Act, until the First Day of February, 1768, under the Regulations and in the Manner mentioned and contained in the said recited Acts; of which all Persons concerned are hereby required to take Notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Florence, July 18. The Court sets out on Tuesday, with a very small Retinue, for Pistolia, but will be absent only Five Days. Princess Craon a few Days ago sat out on her Return to Lorraine.

Letters from Bastia say, that on the 8th Instant, Three Spanish Xebecs and Fourteen Transports, having on Board 970 expelled Jesuits, got under Sail, and that Orders were sent to the other Transports lying in the Gulph of St. Fiorenzo to proceed to Calvi, Ajaccio, and Ajaccio, and to land the Jesuits at those Places; the whole Number of whom, arrived in Corsica, is 2300: And that Orders were sent, at the same Time, to the Commanding Officers of the French Troops in those Places, that, as soon as the Jesuits were landed, they should embark with the Troops on board the Transports that carried the Jesuits, and proceed to France.

Hamburg, July 24. His Danish Majesty is continuing his Route to Copenhagen, according to which he ought to arrive To-day at Flersbourg.

Baron Dieden is here, and is hastening his Preparations as much as possible for his Arrival at London.

Her most Serene Highness the Dutchess of Mecklenbourg Schwerin, accompanied by the Princess Ulrique, are arrived at their House in this City, where they propose passing some Weeks. Their most Serene Highnesses are perfectly well.
