P R E S E N T,
The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act for allowing the Importation of Wheat and Wheat Flour from His Majesty's Colonies in America into this Kingdom, for a limited Time, free of Duty," It is enacted that it shall and may be lawful to and for any of his Majesty's Subjects to import into Great Britain, in any Ship or Vessel navigated according to Law, at any Time or Times before the first Day of August One Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty-seven, any Wheat or Wheat Flour from any of His Majesty's Colonies in America, without the Payment of any Subsidy, Custom, Duty or Imposition whatsoever, in the Manner therein mentioned. And whereas by another Act passed in the said Session of Parliament, entitled, "An Act for granting to His Majesty a certain Sum of Money out of the Sinking Fund, and for applying certain Monies therein mentioned, for the Service of the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty-seven; and for further appropriating the Supplies granted in this Session of Parliament; for carrying to the Aggregate Fund a Sum of Money which hath arisen by the Two-sevenths Excise; for empowering His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to permit the Importation of any Sort of Corn or Grain, Duty Free, into this Kingdom, for a longer Time than is permitted by any Act of this Session of Parliament; and for obviating Doubts, in relation to the Meeting of Commissioners for putting in Execution an Act of this Session for granting an Aid to his Majesty by a Land Tax;" after reciting that it might be expedient, during the Recess of Parliament, to permit the Free Importation of the said Articles into this Kingdom beyond the Time limited by the said Act for the Free Importation thereof; It is enacted, amongst other Things, that it shall and may be lawful to and for His Majesty, from Time to Time, during the next Recess of Parliament, (whenever it shall appear expedient to His Majesty so to do) by His Royal Proclamation to be issued by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, or by his Order in Council to be published in the London Gazette, to permit the Free Importation of the Articles aforesaid from any Parts or Places in His Ma-

jefty's Dominions in America, for any Time or Times until the first Day of February One Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty-eight: And whereas it appears to His Majesty to be expedient at this Time, that the Free Importation of Wheat and Wheat Flour from any Parts or Places in His Majesty's Dominions in America should be further continued; His Majesty doth therefore hereby Order, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, that the Free Importation into Great Britain of Wheat and Wheat Flour by any of His Majesty's Subjects be permitted from any Parts or Places in His Majesty's Dominions in America, in any Ship or Vessel navigated according to Law, from the Expiration of the Time limited for the Importation thereof by the first mentioned Act, until the First Day of February, 1768, under the Regulations and in the Manner mentioned and contained in the said recited Acts; of which all Persons concerned are hereby required to take Notice and govern themselves accordingly.

WHEREAS James Earl of Moray, and John Earl of Hyndford, were duly elected and returned to be Two of the Sixteen Peers of Scotland, to sit in the House of Peers in the present Parliament of Great Britain, and are since deceased; In order to the Electing Two other Peers of Scotland to sit in their Room, We do, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, issue forth this Proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to assemble and meet at Holy Rood House in Edinburgh, on Thursday the First Day of October next, between the Hours of Twelve and Two in the Afternoon, to nominate and choose Two other Peers of Scotland; to sit and vote in the House of Peers of this present Parliament of Great Britain, in the Room of the said James Earl of Moray and John Earl of Hyndford deceased, by open Election and Plurality of Voices of the Peers that shall then be present, and of the Proxies of such as shall be absent, (such Proxies being Peers) and producing a Mandate in Writing duly signed before Witnesses, and both Constituent and Proxy being qualified according to Law. And the Lord Clerk Register, or such Two of the Principal Clerks of the Session as shall be appointed by him to officiate in his Name, are hereby respectively required to attend such Meeting, and to administer the Oaths required

quired by Law to be taken there by the said Peers, and to take their Votes, and immediately after such Election made, and duly examined, to certify the Names of the Peers so elected, and sign and attest the same in the Presence of the said Peers the Electors, and to return such Certificate into Our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain. And we do strictly charge and command that this Proclamation be duly published at the Market Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the County Towns in Scotland, Twenty-five Days at least before the Time hereby appointed for the Meeting of the said Peers to proceed on such Election.

Madrid, July 20. The King of Spain lately reviewed, on two distinct Days, and on different Ground, the whole Garrison of Madrid. All the Royal Family stood in Pavillions built for the Purpose, into which the Foreign Ministers were admitted. Part of this Exercise was a Mock-Fight near the Bridge of Segovia. Don Alexander O'Reilly commanded the Attack, and Don Antonio Manso the Defence. His Catholick Majesty expressed great Satisfaction at the Behaviour of the Troops; and both these Inspectors of Infantry were raised on the same Day to the Rank of Lieutenants-General.

Monignor Lucini, the Pope's Nuncio, arrived here lately, and has had all his Audiences of the Royal Family. Cardinal Pallavicini, his Predecessor, though on the Recovery, is still in a very weak State.

Vienna, July 25. Wednesday last, being the Day appointed for the Publick Thanksgiving for the Empress's Recovery, was observed here with the greatest Solemnity.

On Thursday the Court removed to Shonbrun, where they will spend the Remainder of the Summer.

Berlin, July 28. Last Saturday in the Evening, the Marriage of the Princess Louisa-Henrietta-Wilhelmina of Brandenburg with the Reigning Prince of Anhalt Dessau, was solemnized in the Royal Chapel at Charlottenbourg by the Reverend Mr. Sack, First Chaplain to the King of Prussia; at which Ceremony his Majesty, and the rest of the Royal Family, the Foreign Ministers, and the Nobility, assisted.

Yesterday in the Evening the Ceremony of Betrothing and Exchanging of Rings between her Royal Highness the Princess Wilhelmina of Prussia and his Serene Highness the Prince of

Orange, was performed at Charlottenbourg in the Presence of his Prussian Majesty and the rest of the Royal Family, &c. After which the French Play called Turcaret was acted in the Orangerie: The Gardens on this Occasion were illuminated, there was a grand Supper, and a Ball which lasted till this Morning, when the King of Prussia returned to Potzdamm.
