Moscow, July 16.

THE Empress set out last Tuesday for Troitza, from whence she is expected to return To-morrow.

Stockholm, August 4. Last Saturday the Court came back to their usual Summer Residence at Dronningholm, and the Senate was assembled there Yesterday; but there was no Court for the Foreign Ministers.

Copenhagen, August 8. The Chamberlain Unruh, Deputy from the Dissidents of Poland to this Court, arrived here a few Days ago; and Yesterday he made his Visits to the Foreign Ministers.

Vienna, August 8. The Empress went on Monday Morning to Schlofs-Hoff, and came back to Schonbrun on Thursday in perfect Health.

The Queen of Naples's Marriage is now fixed for the 14th of October; and instead of going for some Days to Luxemburg, as was intended, she will begin her Journey the 16th.

Baron Bartenstein, Vice-Chancellor of Austria and Bohemia, died here suddenly on Wednesday Evening.

Dresden, August 10. Prince Charles, late Duke of Courland, set out Yesterday on a Visit to Count Valstein in Bohemia, where he will take the Diversion of Shooting for a Week or ten Days. Count Wurmbbrandt also left this Place last Saturday for Vienna, having obtained from the Empress Leave of Absence for two Months, in order to settle some Family Affairs that will require his Presence.

Berlin, August 11. Yesterday Morning the King of Prussia, accompanied by his Brother Prince Henry, the Prince Royal of Prussia, and Prince Frederick of Brunswick, set out from Potsdam for Silesia; and that Monarch, it is expected, will return to Potsdam about the Beginning of next Month.

Dublin, August 15.

Wednesday last being the Anniversary of the Birth of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, the Flag was displayed on Birmingham Tower, the Great Guns at the Salute Battery in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix were fired three Rounds, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks. At Noon their Ex-

cellencies the Lords Justices received the Compliments of the Nobility and Gentry on the Occasion: And at Night there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and other Rejoicings throughout the City.
