P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act for allowing the Importation of Oats and Oat-meal, Rye and Rye-meal, into this Kingdom for a limited Time, free of Duty;" it is Enacted, That it shall and may be lawful to and for any Person or Persons whatsoever, to import into this Kingdom, in any Ship or Vessel whatsoever, at any Time or Times before the Twenty-ninth Day of September, One thousand seven hundred and sixty seven, any Oats or Oatmeal, Rye or Rye-meal, without the Payment of any Subsidy, Custom Duty, or Imposition whatsoever, in the Manner therein mentioned. And whereas by several other Acts passed in the said Session of Parliament, the free Importation into this Kingdom of Wheat or Wheat Flour, Barley, Barley-meal, Peas, Beans, Tares, or Callivancies, Malt, Bread, Biscuit, and Starch, from any Part of Europe, by any Person or Persons, in any Ship or Vessel whatsoever, is permitted until the Tenth Day of September, One thousand seven hundred and sixty-seven. — And whereas by another Act passed in the said Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act for granting to His Majesty a certain Sum of Money out of the Sinking Fund, and for applying certain Monies therein mentioned, for the Service of the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty-seven; and for further appropriating the Supplies granted in this Session of Parliament; for carrying to the Aggregate Fund a Sum of Money which hath arisen by the Two-sevenths Excise; for empowering His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to permit

the Importation of any Sort of Corn or Grain, Duty Free, into this Kingdom, for a longer Time than is permitted by any Act of this Session of Parliament; and for obviating Doubts, in relation to the Meeting of Commissioners for putting in Execution an Act of this Session for granting an Aid to His Majesty by a Land Tax;" — After reciting the said former Act, and that it might be expedient, during the Recess of Parliament, to permit the Free Importation of the said Articles mentioned in the said several Acts, into this Kingdom, beyond the Time limited by the said Acts for the Free Importation thereof; It is enacted, amongst other Things, That it shall and may be lawful to and for His Majesty, from Time to Time, during the next Recess of Parliament, (whenever it shall appear expedient to His Majesty so to do) by His Royal Proclamation to be issued by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, or by His Order in Council to be published in the London Gazette, to permit the Free Importation of all or any the said Articles and Things, from any Parts or Places in Europe, for any Time or Times until Twenty Days after the Commencement of the next session of Parliament: — And whereas it appears to His Majesty to be expedient at this Time, that the Free Importation of Oats or Oatmeal, Rye or Rye-meal, Wheat or Wheat Flour, Barley, Barley-meal, Peas, Beans, Tares, or Callivancies, Malt, Bread, Biscuit, and Starch, from any Parts or Places in Europe, should be further continued until Twenty Days after the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament — His Majesty doth therefore hereby Order, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, that the Free Importation into Great Britain of Oats or Oat-meal, Rye or Rye-meal, Wheat or Wheat Flour, Barley, Barley-meal, Peas, Beans, Tares, or Callivancies, Malt, Bread, Biscuit, and Starch, be permitted from any Parts or Places in Europe, in any Ship or Vessel whatsoever, from the Expiration of the respective Times limited by the said

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said Acts for the Free Importation thereof, un'il Twenty Days after the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament, under the Regulations and in the Manner mentioned and contained in the said recited Acts---Of which all Persons concerned are hereby required to take Notice and govern themselves accordingly.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act to prohibit, for a limited Time, the Exportation of Corn, Grain, Meal, Malt, Flour, Bread, Biscuit, and Starch; and also the Exportation of Low Wines and Spirits from Wheat and Wheat Flour;" It is enacted, amongst other Things, That no Person or Persons whatsoever shall, directly or indirectly, export, transport, carry, or convey, or cause or procure to be exported, transported, carried, or conveyed, out of or from the Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, or load or lay on Board, or cause or procure to be laden or laid on Board, in any Ship, or other Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported or carried out of the said Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, with such Exceptions and Qualifications as are therein mentioned, any Sort of Corn, Grain, Meal, Malt, Flour, Bread, Biscuit, or Starch, under the Penalties and Forfeitures in the said Act mentioned, until the Tenth Day of September, One thousand seven hundred and sixty-seven.—And whereas by the said Act His Majesty is authorized and empowered, by His Royal Proclamation to be issued by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, or by His Order in Council to be published in the London Gazette, from Time to Time after the said Tenth Day of September, One thousand seven hundred and sixty-seven, and before the next Session of Parliament, if the same should appear expedient to His Majesty, to prohibit the Exportation of all or any of the said Commodities for any Time or Times until Twenty Days after the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament; such Prohibition not to extend to such or so much of the said Commodities as are allowed by the said Act to be exported, under certain Rules and Regulations, to the Places and for the Purposes therein mentioned.—And whereas it appears to His Majesty to be expedient at this Time that the said Prohibition should be further continued until Twenty Days after the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament—His Majesty doth therefore hereby order, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, That no Person or

Persons whatsoever shall, directly or indirectly, export, transport, carry, or convey, or cause or procure to be exported, transported, carried, or conveyed, out of or from the said Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, or load or lay on Board, or cause or procure to be laden or laid on Board, in any Ship, or other Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported or carried out of the said Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, any Sort of Corn, Grain, Meal, Malt, Flour, Bread, Biscuit, or Starch, from and after the said Tenth Day of September, One thousand seven hundred and sixty-seven, until Twenty Days after the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament, under the Penalties and Forfeitures mentioned in the aforesaid Act; except such or so much of the said Commodities as are allowed by the said Act to be exported, under certain Rules and Regulations, to the Places and for the Purposes therein mentioned.—Of which all Persons concerned are hereby required to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Moscow, July 30. M. Rossignol, the French Consul, and Knight of the Order of St. Michael, arrived here a few Days ago from Petersburg, with the Character of Chargé des Affaires from his Court to her Imperial Majesty.

Schwetzingen, August 15. At Three o'Clock this Morning died the Prince of Deux Pontz, Father-in-Law of his most Serene Highness the Elector Palatine.

Stockholm, August 18. M. Vult von Steyeren, who was lately made President of the College of Revision, died here last Week.

Bonn, August 20. The Elector set out this Morning for Munster, to lay the First Stone of the Palace the States are building for him. His Electoral Highness will be at Arensburg the 1st of next Month for the Opening of the Diet; from thence he will go to Ahauß for six Weeks. When the bad Weather sets in, he will return to Munster, and stay there till next March.

Vienna, August 22. A few Days ago Marshal Botta arrived here from Italy, to make his Compliments of Congratulation to the Empress on her Recovery.

Turin, August 22. His Royal Highness the Duke of Chablais returned to Town last Tuesday, in perfect Health, from his Journey in the Alps. An Express arrived early this Morning at Court, with the News of the Death of the Princess Maria-Louisa-Gabriella, his Sardinian Majesty's second Daughter, who, some Time ago, had retired into a Convent at Quiers, about Ten Miles from hence.

Hague, September 1. M. de Larrey is returned hither from Berlin and Loo, after having settled every Thing relative to the Marriage of the Prince of Orange.

This Day Baron Diede de Furstenstein, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Denmark, had his first private Audience of His Majesty, to deliver his Credentials.
