

“and Wheat Flour;” It is enacted, amongst other Things, That no Person or Persons whatsoever shall, directly or indirectly, export, transport, carry, or convey, or cause or procure to be exported, transported, carried, or conveyed, out of or from the Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, or load or lay on Board, or cause or procure to be laden or laid on Board, in any Ship, or other Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported or carried out of the said Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, with such Exceptions and Qualifications as are therein mentioned, any Sort of Corn, Grain, Meal, Malt, Flour, Bread, Biscuit, or Starch, under the Penalties and Forfeitures in the said Act mentioned, until the Tenth Day of September, One thousand seven hundred and sixty-seven.—And whereas by the said Act His Majesty is authorized and empowered, by His Royal Proclamation to be issued by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, or by His Order in Council to be published in the London Gazette, from Time to Time after the said Tenth Day of September, One thousand seven hundred and sixty-seven, and before the next Session of Parliament, if the same should appear expedient to His Majesty, to prohibit the Exportation of all or any of the said Commodities for any Time or Times until Twenty Days after the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament; such Prohibition not to extend to such or so much of the said Commodities as are allowed by the said Act to be exported, under certain Rules and Regulations, to the Places and for the Purposes therein mentioned.—And whereas it appears to His Majesty to be expedient at this Time that the said Prohibition should be further continued until Twenty Days after the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament—His Majesty doth therefore hereby order, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, That no Person or Persons whatsoever shall, directly or indirectly, export, transport, carry, or convey, or cause or procure to be exported, transported, carried, or conveyed, out of or from the said Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, or load or lay on Board, or cause or procure to be laden or laid on Board, in any Ship, or other Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported or carried out of the said Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, any Sort of Corn, Grain, Meal, Malt, Flour, Bread, Biscuit, or Starch, from and after the said Tenth Day of September, One thousand seven hundred and sixty-seven, until Twenty Days after the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament, under the Penalties and Forfeitures mentioned in the aforesaid Act; except such or so much of the said Commodities as are allowed by the said Act to be exported, under certain Rules and Regulations, to the Places and for the Purposes therein mentioned.—Of which all Persons concerned are hereby required to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.
