P R E S E N T,
The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, intitled, "An Act to prohibit, for a limited Time, the Exportation of Corn, Grain, Meal, Malt, Flour, Bread, Biscuit, and Starch; and also the Exportation of Low Wines and Spirits from Wheat and Wheat Flour;" It is enacted, amongst other Things, That no Person or Persons whatsoever shall, directly or indirectly, export, transport, carry, or convey, or cause or procure to be exported, transported, carried, or conveyed, out of or from the Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, or load or lay on Board, or cause or procure to be laden or laid on Board, in any Ship, or other Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported or carried out of the said Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, with such Exceptions and Qualifications as are therein mentioned, any Sort of Corn, Grain, Meal, Malt, Flour, Bread, Biscuit, or Starch, under the Penalties and Forfeitures in the said Act mentioned, until the Tenth Day of September, One thousand seven hundred and sixty-seven. --- And whereas by the said Act His Majesty is authorized and empowered, by His Royal Proclamation to be issued by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, or by His Order in Council to be published in the London Gazette, from Time to Time after the said Tenth Day of September, One thousand seven hundred and sixty-seven, and before the next Session of Parliament, if the same should appear expedient to His Majesty, to prohibit the Exportation of all or any of the said Commodities for any Time or Times until Twenty Days after the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament; such Prohibition not to extend to such or so much of the said Commodities as are allowed by the said Act to be exported, under certain Rules and Regulations, to the Places and for the Purposes therein mentioned. --- And whereas it appears to His Majesty to be expedient at this Time that the said Prohibition should be further continued until Twenty Days after the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament --- His Majesty doth therefore hereby order, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, That no Person or Persons whatsoever shall, directly or indirectly, export, transport, carry, or convey, or cause or procure to be exported, transported, carried, or

conveyed, out of or from the said Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, or load or lay on Board, or cause or procure to be laden or laid on Board, in any Ship, or other Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported or carried out of the said Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, any Sort of Corn, Grain, Meal, Malt, Flour, Bread, Biscuit, or Starch, from and after the said Tenth Day of September, One thousand seven hundred and sixty-seven, until Twenty Days after the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament, under the Penalties and Forfeitures mentioned in the aforesaid Act; except such or so much of the said Commodities as are allowed by the said Act to be exported, under certain Rules and Regulations, to the Places and for the Purposes therein mentioned. --- Of which all Persons concerned are hereby required to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

THIS Day being the Anniversary of Their Majesties Coronation, there was a grand Appearance of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, to compliment Their Majesties on that Occasion. At Noon the Guns in the Park and at the Tower were fired; and this Evening there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and other Publick Demonstrations of Joy.

Stockholm, September 4. The King returned last Saturday from Ostrogothland, and next Monday he is to review the Upland Regiment, of which Major General Rudbeck is the Colonel, and which is now encamped near Upsal.

Vienna, September 5. On Sunday last the Neapolitan Ambassador made his publick Entry, which was very splendid and magnificent; and on Tuesday next he is to have his formal Audiences of their Imperial Majesties, to demand the Archduchess for the King his Master, with the usual Ceremonies. On that and the two following Days the Court will be in Grand Gala.

Genza, September 5. The French Commissary, who was sent from Bastia to Hiace, has concluded a Suspension of Hostilities between the Republick's Troops and the Corsicans. Another Commissary has been sent to Calvi for the like Purpose. This Convention is to subsist until the Epocha of Time expires that the French were to keep Garrisons in those Towns. The Spanish Frigates and Transports, with the expelled Jesuits, are still in Port, waiting for Orders from the Court of Madrid. There was a violent Storm of Rain and Hail the 1st Instant, accompanied with the loudest Thunder, and Flashes of Lightning, known in the Memory of Man. Seven Persons were killed, and much Damage done to some Churches and Houses.
