PRESENT, The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Hereas by an A& passed in the last Seffion of Parliament, intitled, "An Act to prohibit, for a limited Time, the Ex-" po:tation of Corn, Grain, Meal, Malt, Flour, "Bread, Biscuit, and Starch; and also the Ex-" traction of Low Wines and Spirits from Wheat " and Wheat Flour;" It is enacted, amongst other Things, That no Person or Persons whatfoever shall, directly or indirectly, export, transport, carry, or convey, or cause or procure to be exported, transported, carried, or conveyed, out of or from the Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, or load or lay on Board, or cause or procure to be laden or laid on Board, in any Ship, or other Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported or carried out of the faid Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, with such Exceptions and Qualifications as are therein mentioned, any Sort of Corn, Grain, Meal, Malt, Flour, Bread, Biscuit, or Starch, under the Penalties and Forfeitures in the said A& mentioned, until the Tenth Day of September, One thousand seven -And whereas by hundred and fixty-seven .the faid Act His Majesty is authorized and impowered, b, His Royal Proclamation to be issued by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, or by His Order in Council to be published in the London Gazette, from Time to Time after the said Tenth Day of September, One thousand seven hundred and sixty-seven, and before the next Schion of Parliament, if the fame fhould appear expedient to His Majesty, to prolibit the Exportation of all or any of the faid Commodities for any Time or Times until Twenty Days after the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament; such Prohibition not to extend to fuch or fo much of the faid Commodities as are allowed by the faid Act to be exported, under certain Rules and Regulations, to the Places and for the Purpoles therein men--And whereas it appears to His Mationed. jesty to be expedient at this Time that the faid Prohibition should be further continued until Twenty Days after the Commencement of the next Seffich of Parliament -- His Majesty doth therefore hereby order, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, That no Person or Persons whatsoever shall, directly or indirectly, export, transport, carry, or convey, or cause or procure to be exported, transported, carried, or

conveyed, out of or from the faid Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, or load or lay on Board, or cause or procure to be laden or laid on Board, in any Ship, or other Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported or carried out of the said Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, any Sort of Corn, Grain, Meal, Malt, Flour, Bread, Biscuit, or Starch, from and after the faid Tenth Day of September, One thousand seven hundred and sixty-seven, until Twenty Days after the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament, under the Penalties and Forfeitures mentioned in the aforefaid Act; except such or so much of the faid Commodities as are allowed by the faid Act to be exported, under certain Kules and Regulations, to the Places and for the Purpoles - Of which all Persons therein mentioned. concerned are hereby required to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.
