ON Sunday last Captain Wrottesley arrived here from Monaco, with the melancholy Account, That his Royal Highness Edward Augustus, Duke of York and Albany, died at that Place on the 17th Instant, about Eleven o'Clock in the Morning, of a malignant Fever, after a severe Illness of Fourteen Days, to the great Grief of Their Majesties, and all the Royal Family. The Body was opened and embalmed; and was ordered by Commodore Spry to be put on Board His Majesty's Ship Montreal, Captain Cosby, to be brought to England.

Berlin, Sept. 19. Last Tuesday the Regiments of Lottum and Zuenert, Infantry, the Regiment of Gens d'Armes and one Squadron of the Gardes du Corps, Cavalry, in Garrison here, as also the Regiment of Prince Henry of Prussia, Fuziliers, which lies in Spandow, marched to Potzdam, where, together with the Garrison of that Place, they were exercised, and manœuvred before his Prussian Majesty, for three Days successively; and this Morning they returned to their respective Garrisons. This puts an End to the Reviews and Manœuvres for this Year.

The King of Prussia is expected in this Capital To-morrow or next Day, but his Stay, it is said, will be very short. Count Verclst, Envoy Extraordinary from the States General at this Court, sets out To-morrow for Brunswick, in order to wait the Arrival of the Prince Stadtholder, who it is expected will reach that Place on Friday or Saturday next.

Dresden, Sept. 20. Prince Clement of Saxony arrived here from Vienna on Wednesday last, and intends staying about a Fortnight.

The Court was to have left Pilsnitz Yesterday, and come to reside in Town till the Commencement of the Leipzig Fair; but the Administrator, on Account of the fine Weather, proposes staying some Days longer in the Country.

Prince Charles, late Duke of Courland, set out Yesterday for Dessau to take the Diversion of Hunting there for eight or ten Days.

Hamburgh, Sept. 22. On Thursday last their most Serene Highnesses the Duchesses of Mecklenburgh, and the Princesses of Ulrique, set out from hence for Schwerin, where they return, in perfect Health.
