 “ a Lottrey where our Mayor had the best
 “ Prize and now you have built a fine house wee
 “ will Levell it to the Ground wee have hired five
 “ or 6 Bludy Fellows to help us and wee will be
 “ Revenged wee are all sworn to keep Seckritts
 “ so minde your Self ”

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in Writing both, or either, of the said anonymous Letters, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person or Persons who actually wrote the said Letters) who shall discover his, her, or their Accomplice or Accomplices in the said Facts, or either of them, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
