St. James's, October 25.

THIS Day being the Anniversary of the King's Accession to the Throne, who entered into the Eighth Year of His Reign, there was a very numerous and brilliant Appearance of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, to compliment His Majesty on the Occasion. At Noon the Guns in the Park and at the Tower were fired; and in the Evening there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and other Publick Demonstrations of Joy throughout London and Westminster.

AT the Court at *St. James's*, the 23d Day of *October*, 1767,
P R E S E N T,
The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the Thirty-third Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, intitled, "An Act for preventing the excessive Use of Spirituous Liquors, by laying additional Duties thereon; for shortening the Prohibition of making Low Wines and Spirits from Wheat, Barley, Malt, or other Grain, and from Meal, Flour, and Bran; for encouraging the Exportation of British-made Spirits; and for more effectually securing the Duties payable upon Spirits, and preventing the fraudulent Relanding or Importation thereof" — It is enacted, amongst other Things, That if at any Time or Times after the Twenty-first Day of April, 1760, during the Recess of Parliament, the Price of Wheat shall exceed Forty-eight Shillings the Quarter, Winchester Measure, for Two successive Market Days, in the Port of London, and it shall appear expedient to His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, to prohibit the Making of Low Wines and Spirits from Wheat, Barley, Malt, and any other Sort of Grain, and from Meal, Flour, and Bran, or any Mixture therewith, it shall and may be lawful to and for His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, from Time to Time, by His or Their Royal Proclamation or

Proclamations, to be issued by and with the Advice of His or Their Privy Council, or by His or Their Order in Council, to be published in the London Gazette, from Time to Time to prohibit the Making, Extracting, or Distilling, of any Kind of Low Wines or Spirits from any Wheat, Barley, Malt, and any other Sort of Grain, and from Meal, Flour, and Bran, or any Mixture therewith, for any Time or Times during such Recess, or until Twenty Days after the Commencement of the then next Session of Parliament. — And whereas His Majesty hath received Information, That the Price of Wheat in the Port of London, has been, for Two successive Market Days, above Forty-eight Shillings the Quarter, Winchester Measure. — His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby prohibit the Making, Extracting, or Distilling, of any Kind of Low Wines or Spirits from any Wheat, Wheat Meal, Wheat Flour, and Wheat Bran, or any Mixture therewith, from the Date hereof, until Fourteen Days after the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament. — Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and yield due Obedience to His Majesty's Commands hereby signified.

Dublin Castle, October 20.

THIS Day the Parliament having met according to the Prorogation, his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant went in State to the House of Peers, and being seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod was sent with a Message from his Excellency to the House of Commons, signifying his Pleasure that they should immediately attend his Excellency in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, his Excellency made the following Speech to both Houses:

My Lords and Gentlemen,

It is with great Satisfaction that, in Obedience to His Majesty's Commands, I now meet you here in Parliament, being confident, that the End of all your Consultations will be

to support the Honor of the Crown, and the just Rights and Liberties of the People.

As nothing can be more conducive to these great Ends than the Independency and Uprightness of the Judges of the Land, in the impartial Administration of Justice; I have it in Charge from His Majesty to recommend this interesting Object to Parliament, that such Provision may be made for securing the Judges in the Enjoyment of their Offices and Appointments, during their good Behaviour, as shall be thought most expedient.

I shall be happy to co-operate with you in this great Work, so graciously recommended by the King, and in whatever may tend to the effectual and expeditious Distribution of Justice throughout every Part of this flourishing Country, whose Constitution and best Security is a Government by Law.

Deeply interested as We are in the Domestic Happiness of our most amiable Sovereign, you cannot but reflect with Pleasure on the Increase of His Majesty's Family by the Birth of a Princess Royal; and affectionately attached as We must be to every Branch of that illustrious House, I am persuaded you feel most sensibly the affecting Event of the Death of his Royal Highness the Duke of York, whose many and eminent Virtues had justly endeared him to His Majesty and all His Subjects.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I have ordered the proper Officers to prepare and lay before you the necessary Estimates, and have no other Supplies to ask but such as have been usually given; trusting, at the same Time, to your Wisdom and Zeal to make further Provisions if the necessary Support of Government, and the Safety of this Country, shall require it.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

The Protestant Charter-Schools have, from their first Institution, met with the constant Assistance and Protection of Parliament; the same Disposition, I am persuaded, will still continue, as they are the great Sources of Industry, Virtue, and true Religion.

The Linen Manufacture calls likewise for your utmost Attention; and it would be a pleasing Circumstance to me, if during my Administration. I could see Foreigners entirely prevented from interfering in any Article of this important Consumption.

You may depend upon His Majesty's gracious Disposition to consent to all such Laws as shall be for the Welfare and true Interest of this Kingdom.

On my own Part you may be assured, that I will, with the utmost Satisfaction, concur with you in every Thing that may promote the Publick Good; and upon all Occasions contribute my best Endeavours for advancing the Happiness and Prosperity of the People of Ireland.

Vienna, October 7. On Saturday Night the future Queen of Naples was suddenly seized

with a severe Pain in her Back, and violent Fever. She was bled on Sunday; but the Fever rather rose than abated after the Bleeding; and Yesterday at Noon the Disorder shewed itself to be the Small-Pox. This has spread a general Alarm, though there is as yet no bad Symptom; and her Youth, and the Goodness of her Constitution, are strong Circumstances in her Favour. The Orders for the Journey were immediately countmanded; and Yesterday Messengers were dispatched to Florence, Naples, and Madrid, with the News of this unhappy Event. The Arch Duke and the Two Arch-Duchesses, who have not had the Small Pox, removed immediately from Schnbrun to the Palace in Town.

The Empress has conferred the Government of Transylvania upon General O'Donnell.

Brussels, October 16. On Wednesday his Royal Highness and the Court came here from Mairimont for the Winter Season; and Yesterday being St. Theresa, the Name-Day of her Imperial Majesty, at Noon there was a great Gala at Court; in the Evening a Drawing-Room and Supper; and at Night a Mask'd Ball at the Great Theatre.

Berlin, October 17. Last Sunday the 11th, in the Afternoon, his Prussian Majesty returned to Potzdam; and on Monday the Prince and Princess of Orange, with their Retinue, set out for the same Place, where they remained till Wednesday in the Afternoon, when they proceeded to Brandenburg; the next Day to Magdebourg; and thence to Brunswick, where they proposed stopping for three Days. From that Place they will continue their Journey directly to Loo, at which Place it is reckoned they may arrive about the 27th Instant.
