*The Queen's Palace, St. James's Park,
November 2, 1767.*

THIS Day about Noon the Queen was happily delivered of a Prince. Her Royal Highness the Princess Dowager of Wales, his Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury, several Lords of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, and the Ladies of Her Majesty's Bed-Chamber, were present.

This great Event was soon after made known by the Firing of the Tower Guns. Her Majesty is, God be praised, as well as can be expected; and the Young Prince is in perfect Health.

Whitehall, November 3.

Yesterday Morning, about Ten o'Clock, His Majesty's Yacht Mary came to an Anchor off Greenwich, with the Corpse of his late Royal Highness the Duke of York. About Three o'Clock in the Afternoon the Body was put on Board the Admiralty Shallop, and landed at Greenwich; from whence it was conveyed in a Hearse to the Prince's Chamber between Five and Six, preceded by the Coaches of their Royal Highnesses the Dukes of Cumberland and Gloucester, and his late Royal Highness's State Coach, and followed by a Party of the Horse Guards, and a great Number of Coaches, &c. of the Nobility, and other Persons of Distinction. The Body lay in State in the Prince's Chamber this Day; and will be privately interred about Ten o'Clock at Night, in the Royal Vault in King Henry the Seventh's Chapel.

Minute Guns were fired from all the Yachts, from the Time of the Body's being put on Board the Shallop, till its Arrival in the Prince's Chamber.

The Particulars of the Ceremonial of Interment will be inserted in the next Gazette.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the Thirty-third Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, intituled, "An Act for preventing the excessive Use of Spirituous Liquors, by laying additional Duties thereon; for shortening the Prohibition of making Low Wines and Spirits from Wheat, Barley, Malt, or other Grain; and from Meal, Flour, and Bran; for encouraging the Exportation of British-made Spirits; and for more effectually securing the Duties payable upon Spirits, and preventing the fraudulent Relanding or Importation thereof" — It is enacted, amongst other Things, That if at any Time or Times after the Twenty-first Day of April, 1760, during the Recess of Parliament, the Price of Wheat shall exceed Forty-eight Shillings the Quarter, Winchester Measure, for Two successive Market Days, in the Port of London, and it shall appear expedient to His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, to prohibit the Making of Low Wines and Spirits from Wheat, Barley, Malt, and any other Sort of Grain; and from Meal, Flour, and Bran, or any Mixture therewith, it shall and may be lawful to and for His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, from Time to Time, by His or Their Royal Proclamation or Proclamations, to be issued by and with the Advice of His or Their Privy Council, or by His or Their Order in Council, to be published in the London Gazette, from Time to Time to prohibit the Making, Extracting, or Distilling, of any Kind of Low Wines or Spirits from any Wheat, Barley, Malt, and any other Sort of Grain, and from Meal, Flour, and Bran, or any Mixture therewith, for any Time or Times during

during such Recess, or until Twenty Days after the Commencement of the then next Session of Parliament.—And whereas His Majesty hath received Information, That the Price of Wheat in the Port of London, has been, for Two successive Market Days, above Forty-eight Shillings the Quarter, Winchester Measure.—His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby prohibit the Making, Extracting, or Distilling, of any Kind of Low Wines or Spirits from any Wheat, Wheat Meal, Wheat Flour, and Wheat Bran, or any Mixture therewith, from the Date hereof, until Fourteen Days after the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament.—Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and yield due Obedience to His Majesty's Commands hereby signified.

Madrid, October 15. His Excellency Sir James Gray, His Britannick Majesty's Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary, arrived here on Tuesday last the 13th Instant.

Genoa, October 17. Last Night arrived Monsignor Lercari from Rome, to take Possession of the Dignity of Archbishop of this City, lately conferred on him by the Pope.

Lisbon, October 21. The Reigning Count of Schaumbourg Lippe arrived at Belem, where the Court now resides, on Tuesday Evening the 13th Instant.

His most Faithful Majesty has been pleased to make the following Promotions, viz.

The Conde Ja Cunha is to come back from the Rio de Janeiro, and is already appointed President of the Conselho Ultramarino. He is to be succeeded as Vice-roy of all the Brazils, and Governor of the Rio de Janeiro, by the Conde de Azambujo, actual Governor of the Bahia, or Bay of All Saints.

The Conde de Avintes, now Marquez de Lavradio, succeeds the Conde de Azambujo as Governor of the Bahia.

The Conde de Pavoide is appointed Governor of Pernambuco, in the room of the Conde de Villa-Flores, who is to return Home, and is to be one of the Commissioners of the Conselho Ultramarino.

Dom Inercencio de Souza, Brother to the Minister at Paris, and Governor of Angola, is appointed Vice-roy of Goa; and the young Conde de Valadares is to succeed him as Governor of Angola.

Sir Luis Pinto, a Knight of Malta, is appointed Governor of Alato Grosso, in the room of the Brother of Dom Gaston, who is recalled.

M. de Sá, Brother of the Minister of Naples, was appointed some Time ago Governor of the Island of Madeira, but is still here.

Dublin, October 27.

Sunday last being the Anniversary of His Majesty's happy Accession to the Throne, in the Morning the Flag was displayed on Birmingham Tower; at Noon his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant received the Compliments of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction; and the Great Guns at the Salute Battery in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix were fired three Rounds, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks: And Yesterday-Evening a Play was given by his Excellency for the Entertainment of the Ladies; and the Night concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in Writing the said threatening and incendiary Paper, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually wrote the said Paper) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof: And also a Reward of One Hundred Pounds to the Person making such Discovery; to be paid by the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, upon the Conviction of any one or more of the Offenders.
