A RESOLUTION and ORDER of the House of COMMONS.

Martis 15^o die Decembris 1767.

Resolved,

THAT One Third Part of the Capital Stock of Annuities after the Rate of Four Pounds per Centum, established by an Act made in the Third Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, An Act for granting to His Majesty several additional Duties upon Wines imported into this Kingdom, and certain Duties upon all Cyder and Perry, and for raising the Sum of Three Millions Five Hundred Thousand Pounds by Way of Annuities and Lotteries to be charged on the said Duties, which shall remain after the Fifth Day of January next, be redeemed and paid off on the Fifth Day of July next, after discharging the Interest then payable in respect of the same.

Ordered,

That Mr. Speaker do forthwith give Notice, That One Third Part of the Capital Stock of Annuities, after the Rate of Four Pounds per Centum, established by an Act made in the Third Year of his Majesty's Reign, intituled, An Act for granting to His Majesty several additional Duties upon Wines imported into this Kingdom, and certain Duties upon all Cyder and Perry, and for raising the Sum of Three Millions Five Hundred Thousand Pounds, by Way of Annuities and Lotteries to be charged on the said Duties, which shall remain after the Fifth Day of January next, will be redeemed and paid off on the Fifth Day of July next, after discharging the Interest then payable in respect of the same, agreeable to the Clauses and Powers of Redemption contained in the said Act.

Which Resolution and Order, thus signed and published by Me, are to be sufficient Notice of the Repayment of One Third Part of the said Capital Stock of Annuities which shall remain after the Fifth Day of January next, and of the Redemption of so much of the said Annuities as are attending on the said Third Part.

St. James's, December 15.

AS several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms; The following Abstracts of Two Acts of Parliament of George the First and George the Second, to prevent such Practices are published for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them.—And it will be observed, that they extend to those who are any ways concerned or

instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms; and in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

IF any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool; Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof upon Indictment or Information, in any of the Court at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter-Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Person having been once convicted, shall offend again, he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the said Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after warning given by the Ambassador, Minister or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where such Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorized by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from thenceforth inhabit within this Realm, such Person shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor, or Administrator, and of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom by Descent, Devise, or Purchase; and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom to His Majesty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made upon Oath before any Justice of Peace, that any Person is endeavouring to seduce any such Artificer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted, or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes aforesaid: Such Justice may send his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of one Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the said Offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions; And if such Person shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Gaol till the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions; and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any such Artificer shall be convicted upon Indictment of any such Promise, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas for the Purposes aforesaid, he

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he shall give such Security to the King, not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security given.

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the same shall be prosecuted in the Court of Justiciary, or the Circuits there.

Statute 23d. George III. Chap. 13.

IF any Persons shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great-Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland, into any foreign Country, not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted upon Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Justiciary, or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland; or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with, or seduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the common Gaol of the Country or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in Case of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending, shall forfeit for every Person contracted with or seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such Forfeiture be paid.

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on Board any Ship or Boat not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any such Tools or Utensils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufactures, or any Part of such Tools, he shall for every Offence forfeit all such Tools, or Parts thereof, put on Board; and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Essoin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, and for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majesty's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall find on Board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publickly sold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize and secure the same.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the said Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on Board his Vessel, he shall for every such Offence forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and if the Vessel belongs

to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forfeit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly suffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or sign any Cocket or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the said Tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the same.

Stockholm, November 24. Yesterday being one of the Anniversaries of the King of Sweden's Orders, a grand Chapter was held, in which above 100 Knights of the Order of the Sword, and of the Polar Star, were made; and among the former, all the Officers of the Guards who have the Rank of Captain.

Copenhagen, November 24. The Danish Frigate with the Cadets on Board is at last arrived here.

Copenhagen, November 28. His Danish Majesty was at the Holm on Wednesday last, to see two Ships launched, one of 90 Guns, called Christian the Seventh; the other of 50, called the Sleswick.

This being the Birth-Day of the Queen Sophia Magdalena, who now enters into her 68th Year, his Danish Majesty and the Queen Dowager went to Hirsholm to celebrate it there.

Copenhagen, December 5. The Prince Royal East-India Man, Captain Elphinstone, sailed from hence Yesterday for Bengal.

Vienna, November 25. Her Imperial Majesty returned from Presbourg Yesterday, and the Emperor on Sunday last.

Berlin, November 28. His Prussian Majesty will continue at Potsdam till the 20th of next Month, when he is expected at Berlin, the Carnival being to begin about that Time.

A few Days ago their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess Ferdinand of Prussia, with their Family, removed from their Country-Seat at Fredericksfelde, into this Capital, for the Winter-Season.

Vienna, December 2. Last Monday being St. Andrew's Day, the Patron of the Order of the Golden Fleece, His Imperial Majesty and the Archdukes, after having assisted at the Service appointed for that Occasion, with the usual Ceremonies, dined in Publick. All the Knights of the Order who were in Town, to the Number of about Thirty, had the Honour of dining in the same Hall at another Table, as is customary on this Day.

Berlin, December 5. Baron Borke, the Prussian Minister at Copenhagen, is recalled; and Baron Vink, Dean of the Chapter of Minden, is named to succeed him as Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Prussia at that Court.

Brussels, December 11. To-morrow being the Birth-Day of his Royal Highness Prince Charles, his Sister Madame Royale, and her Court, came to Town from Mons Yesterday Evening.
