**A** Chapter of the most Noble Order of the Garter having been summoned to meet this Day, the Knights Companions, with the Officers of the Order hereafter mentioned, all in their Mantles, attended the Sovereign in his own Apartment; and being called over by Garter King of Arms, a Proceſſion was made from thence to the Great Council Chamber in the following Order:

Earl of Hertford, — Duke of Northumberland,  
Earl of Winchelsea,  
His Royal Highness Duke of Gloucester,  
Black Rod, — The Register, — Garter King of Arms,

## The SOVEREIGN.

The Sovereign and Knights Companions being seated, the Register acquainted His Majesty, that the Bishop of Salisbury attended at the Door, and humbly prayed Admittance to be sworn as Chancellor of that most Noble Order; who being in his Mantle, was conducted to the Sovereign by Garter and Black Rod, the latter carrying the Insignia of the Chancellor's Office; and the Bishop kneeling before the Sovereign, the Oath was administered to him by the Register; His Majesty then put the Gold Chain with the Badge about his Neck, and delivered him the Purse; and having kissed His Majesty's Hand, he withdrew to his Place.

The Chancellor then signified to the Chapter the Sovereign's Pleasure for filling up the vacant Stall; and as by the Statutes none but a Knight can be elected, Garter and Black Rod were sent to introduce his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland, who was knighted by the Sovereign with the Sword of State.

The Knights Companions then proceeded to the Election, and the Suffrages being collected by the Chancellor, and presented to the Sovereign, his Royal Highness Henry Duke of Cumberland was, by His Majesty's Command, declared duly elected. His Royal Highness was thereupon received at the Door of the Chapter-Room by the two junior Knights present, and conducted between them to the Sovereign, preceded by Garter King of Arms (carrying the Ensigns of the Order upon a Cushion) and Black Rod. Garter presenting the Garter to the Sovereign, His Majesty delivered it to the two senior Knights, who buckled it on the Prince's Left Leg, the Chancellor reading the Admonition; Garter then presented the Ribbon with the George, and the Prince kneeling down, the Sovereign, with the Assistance of the two senior Knights, put it over his Shoulder, the Chancellor reading the Admonition; and having kissed His Majesty's Hand, and severally saluted all the Knights present, his Royal Highness withdrew.

Garter then calling over the Knights in their

Order, a Proceſſion was made back in the same Order as before, except that the Chancellor now went in his Place with the Prelate.

**T**HIS Day His Majesty was pleased to invest the Dukes of Buccleugh and Athol with the Ensigns of the most Ancient and most Noble Order of the Thistle.

His Majesty having signed the several Instruments for that Purpose, which were presented to the Sovereign by Robert Quarne, Esq; Gentleman Usher of the Green Rod, (in the Absence of George Dempster, Esq; the Secretary) his Grace the Duke of Buccleugh was then called into the Royal Presence, being preceded by the Earl of Portmore, as senior Knight of the Thistle, and supported on each Side by the Earl of Morton and Lord Cathcart, two other Knights of the Order; Mr. Brodie, Principal Herald of Scotland, (in Place of the Gentleman Usher of the Green Rod) carrying the Sword of State. At the Entrance a low Reverence was made; a second about the Middle; and, on being advanced up to the Sovereign, a third. — His Grace then kneeling down, the Herald drew the Sword, and (kneeling) delivered it to the Sovereign, who thereupon knighted his Grace; then the Duke, having kissed His Majesty's Hand, rose up, and Green Rod administered the Oath to his Grace; which done, Green Rod (having received the Green Ribbon, with the Symbol of the Order hanging to it) presented the same (kneeling) to the Sovereign, upon a Velvet Cushion, who put the Ribbon over the Duke's Left Shoulder, and then, kneeling down, he had again the Honour of kissing His Majesty's Hand; which done, his Grace rose up, and, making a low Reverence, withdrew.

In like Manner was his Grace the Duke of Athol invested.

The Ceremony was performed soon after the Levee, in His Majesty's Closet, several of the Great Officers of the Court being present.

His Majesty was pleased, at the same Time, to appoint the Earl of Carlisle to be one of the Knights of the Thistle; but his Lordship was not invested on Account of his being Abroad.

*AS several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms; The following Abstracts of Two Acts of Parliament of George the First and George the Second, to prevent such Practices, are published for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them.—And it will be observed, that they extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, and in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.*

*Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.*

**I**F any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof upon Indictment or Information, in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter-Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Person having been once convicted, shall offend again, he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the said Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where such Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorized by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from thenceforth inhabit within this Realm; such Person shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor, or Administrator, and of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom by Descent, Devise, or Purchase; and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom to His Majesty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made upon Oath before any Justice of Peace, that any Person is endeavouring to seduce any such Artificer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted, or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions; for the Purposes aforesaid; such Justice may send his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of one Witness, or by Confession; that he was guilty of any of the said Offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions: And if

such Person shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Gaol till the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions, and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any such Artificer shall be convicted upon Indictment of any such Promise, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas for the Purposes aforesaid, he shall give such Security to the King, not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security given.

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the same shall be prosecuted in the Court of Juticiary, or the Circuits there.

*Statute 23d. George II. Chap. 13.*

**I**F any Persons shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great-Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland, into any foreign Country, not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted upon Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Juticiary, or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland; or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with, or seduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the common Gaol of the Country or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in Case of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forfeit, for every Person contracted with or seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such Forfeiture be paid.

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on Board any Ship or Boat not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any such Tools or Utensils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufactures, or any Part of such Tools, he shall for every Offence forfeit all such Tools, or Parts thereof, put on Board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Essoin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, and for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majesty's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall find on Board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publicly sold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the

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the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize and secure the same.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the said Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on Board his Vessel, he shall for every such Offence forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and if the Vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forfeit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly suffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or sign any Cocket or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the said Tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the same.

Whereas it hath been humbly represented to the King, That on the Night of the 28th of November last, a Sash Window, in the House of James Poole, Esq; at Taunton in Somersetshire, was forcibly raised, and a Quantity of Gunpowder thrown into the Room, at the same Instant that a small Quantity was set Fire to on the Window Sill, with an Intention, as is supposed, to communicate with the Gunpowder that was thrown into the Room, by which it was considerable Damage must have been done to the House: His Majesty, for the discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned therein, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually threw the Gunpowder into the said Room, and set Fire to same on the Window Sill) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
