AT the Court at *St. James's*, the 15th Day of *January*, 1768,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in His Privy Council.

WHEREAS William M<sup>c</sup>Andrew, late of *Elgin*, in the County of *Elgin*, in that Part of Great Britain called *Scotland*, *Glover*, William M<sup>c</sup>Gillivray, late of the same Place, *Tobacconist*, William Proctor the Younger, late of the same Place, *Square-Wright*, James Stephen, late of the same Place, *Butcher*, John Ruffel, late of the same Place, *Shoemaker*, and John M<sup>c</sup>Lay, late of the same Place, *Slater*, were, upon the Twenty-fourth Day of *December* last, charged by Information of a credible Person upon Oath by him subscribed, before the Right Honourable Thomas Miller, Esquire, Lord Justice Clerk in *Scotland*, with having been guilty, upon the Thirtieth Day of *July*, One thousand seven hundred and sixty-six, of being, together with several others, disguised and armed with Fire Arms and other offensive Weapons; and so armed, being assembled at *Elgin* aforesaid in order to break open the Excise Office there, and to rescue and take away, after Seizure, uncustomed Goods, which had been seized and lodged there by the Officers of Excise; and also with having been guilty of breaking open the said Office, and rescuing and taking away, after Seizure, the said uncustomed Goods.—Which Information was afterwards certified by the said Lord Justice Clerk, under his Hand and Seal, to one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; and the same having been laid before His Majesty in His Privy Council, pursuant to the Act of Parliament of the Nineteenth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, in that Case made and provided; His Majesty doth, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, by this His Order in His Privy Council, Require and Command, that the said William M<sup>c</sup>Andrew, William M<sup>c</sup>Gillivray, William Proctor the Younger, James Stephen, John Ruffel, and John M<sup>c</sup>Lay, and each of them, do surrender himself and themselves within the Space of Forty Days after the first Publication of this Order in the *London Gazette*, to any of the Lords of Justice, or to any one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace in *Scotland*.
