Constantinople, December 16. It is reported, that an Express arrived from Grand Cairo to the Porte, which has brought the News, that the New Pasha had found out Means, by calling the Affistance of Ali Beg, who was drove out some Time ago, to banish Sixteen of the Begs; which, if true, will probably reduce that Country to a more immediate Dependance upon the Porte.

And from Alexandria of a later Date, the 23d of October, that Seven Begs of the Town had collected an Army and divided it; the one, that attacked above the Town, was enrirely routed, and the other in the greatest Confusion; so that it is supposed the Town will surrender to him, and the Seven Begs make their Escape.
