Westminster, January 29.

THIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Francis Molyneux, Knt. Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to

An Act to continue and amend an Act, made in the Fifth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act for Importation of Salted Beef, Pork, Bacon, and Butter, from Ireland, for a limited Time; and for allowing the Importation of Salted Beef, Pork, Bacon, and Butter, from the British Dominions in America, for a limited Time.

An Act to enable His Majesty to license a Playhouse in the City of Bath.

An Act for making and maintaining a Navigable Cut or Canal, from the River Severn, at or near a Place called Hawford, in the Parish of Claines in the County of Worcester, to or near a Place called Chapel Bridge, within the Borough of Droitwich in the said County.

An Act for making a Navigable Canal from the City of Coventry, to communicate upon Fradley Heath, in the County of Stafford, with a Canal now making between the Rivers Trent and Mersey.

An Act to continue the Terms and enlarge the Powers of several Acts of the Twelfth of Queen Anne, the Twelfth of King George the First, and the Twenty-second of his late Majesty, for repairing the Road from the City of Worcester, through Droitwich, to Bromsgrove, and other Roads therein-mentioned; and to repeal an Act of the Twenty-eighth Year of his late Majesty, for repairing the Roads lying and leading from Droitwich aforesaid, and for amending the several Roads which were directed to be repaired by the said Act.

And to Four Private Bills.

Constantinople, December 16. It is reported, that an Express arrived from Grand Cairo to the Porte, which has brought the News, that the New Pasha had found out Means, by calling the Assistance of Ali Beg, who was drove out some Time ago, to banish Sixteen of the Begg; which, if true, will probably reduce that Country to a more immediate Dependance upon the Porte.

Since writing the above, we have Advices from Cairo, that Ali Beg had collected an Army together, and had taken Possession of the Nile above and below the Town, so as to prevent any Provisions passing; which had occasioned

the greatest Consternation. And from Alexandria of a later Date, the 23d of October, that Seven Begg of the Town had collected an Army and divided it; the one, that attacked above the Town, was entirely routed, and the other in the greatest Confusion; so that it is supposed the Town will surrender to him, and the Seven Begg make their Escape.

The Bailo had his Audience of the Grand Signior the 8th Instant; and the Ragusean Ambassadors paid their Tribute, and had their Audience of the Grand Signior Yesterday.

Naples, January 5. We have had here continual Storms of Thunder, Lightning, Hail, and Rain, for this Fortnight past.

His Sicilian Majesty is still at Perfano, but will be at Naples on his Birth-day the 12th of this Month.

Stockholm, January 12. We have now Four Posts due from England, and the last Letters from thence, which were of the 15th past, arrived here only on Sunday.

Copenhagen, January 12. The Belts have for some Time been impassable. No Post from Hamburg arrived during the last Week; and we have Five due from England.

Vienna, January 13. The 7th of April is the Day fixed for the Departure of the future Queen of Naples. Madame la Comtesse de Paar, Wife to the Postmaster-General of the Hereditary Dominions, is to have the Honour of accompanying her with the Character of Grand Maitresse.

Berlin, January 19. Yesterday being the Birth-Day of his Royal Highness Prince Henry of Prussia, the King's next Brother, when he entered into the 43d Year of his Age, that Prince received in the Morning, at his Palace, the Compliments of the Nobility and Foreign Ministers residing at this Court; and in the Evening there was a great Supper and Ball at the Palace, in the Queen of Prussia's Apartment.

Hague, January 26. The Prince of Orange celebrated on Sunday last his Prussian Majesty's Birth-Day.
