A RESOLUTION and ORDER of the House of COMMONS.

Lunæ, 8^o Die Februarii, 1768.

Resolved,

THAT such Part of the Capital Stock of Annuities at the Rate of Four Pounds per Centum, established by an Act made in the Third Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, An Act for granting to His Majesty several additional Duties upon Wines imported into this Kingdom, and certain Duties upon all Cyder and Perry, and for raising the Sum of Three Million Five Hundred Thousand Pounds by Way of Annuities and Lotteries to be charged on the said Duties, as shall remain after the 5th Day of July next, be redeemed and paid off in Manner following; that is to say, One Half of such remaining Part of the said Capital Stock of Annuities on the 10th Day of October next, and the other Half, being the Residue of such Capital Stock, on the 5th Day of January 1769, after discharging the Interest due on each of the said Days upon the respective Parts of the said Capital Stock which is then to be redeemed and paid off.
