**T**HE Grand Signior has given his eldest Daughter, a Princess of Seven Years old, to the Nizanji-bashi; and Yesterday the Grand Vizir clothed him with the Pellice, and declared him Son-in-Law to the Sultan. This young Princess is the Widow of the late Vizir, who was beheaded three Years ago at Meteline.
