**F**RIDAY the 29th of January, being the Birth-day of his Danish Majesty, who then entered into his Twentieth Year, the Foreign Ministers, Nobility, &c. were at Court to compliment him on the Occasion. In the Evening there was a Ball and Supper at Court, at which they were present.

The Queen and the young Prince Royal are both in perfect Health.

The young Prince was christened on Saturday last, by the Name of Frederick. The Ceremony was performed in the Queen's Bed-Chamber; and his Majesty was pleased, upon this Occasion, to invest Count Ahlefeldt and M. de Gram the Grand Veneur, with the Order of the Elephant, and his Son with that of Dannebrog; which was likewise sent to M. Dieden at London; and to M. de Gleichen at Paris

*Hamburgh, February 9.* On Sunday Te Deum was sung at Altona, to return Thanks for the Queen of Denmark's happy Delivery. Last Night the First President, Baron de Gahler, gave a grand Masquerade Ball, to which much Company were invited from this City. And To-night the whole Town will be finely illuminated.

In Consequence of which Threatening, he retired; and they followed him almost up to Cranbourn, and fired at him at about Forty Yards Distance: After which he summoned another Keeper or two, and went in Pursuit of them, and tracked them to Water Oakley, by the Blood of the Deer they had killed: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons herein concerned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually fired at the said Isaac Knight) who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof; and also a Reward of Fifty Pounds to any Person making such Discovery; to be paid by the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, upon the Conviction of any one or more of the Offenders.
