**T**HIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Mr. Quarne, Yeoman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to

*An Act for the Regulation of His Majesty's Marine Forces while on Shore.*

*An Act for further regulating the Proceedings of the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies, with respect to the making of Dividends.*

*An Act to explain and amend so much of an Act, made in the Tenth Year of the Reign of King William the Third, intituled, An Act for granting an Aid to His Majesty, for disbanded the Army, and other necessary Occasions, as relates to the Number of Troops to be kept upon the Irish Establishment.*

*An Act for providing proper Accommodations for His Majesty's Justices of the Great Sessions in Wales, during the Time of holding such Sessions.*

*An Act for the more speedy and effectual Transportation of Offenders.*

*An Act for making and maintaining a navigable Cut, or Canal, from Birmingham to Bilstone, and from thence to Autherley, there to communicate with the Canal now making between the Rivers Severn and Trent, and for making collateral Cuts up to several Coal Mines.*
