**T***Copenhagen, February 9.*  
HE Queen Mother returned here last Week from Hirschholm.  
*Florence, February 12.* The Great Dutcheſs was brought to Bed this Morning, between Four and Five o'Clock, of a Prince, and both are as well as can be expected. This happy Event was announced at Break of Day to the Publick by the Diſcharge of an Hundred Cannon from the Fortreſs that is the moſt diſtant from the Palace. Her Royal Highneſs was at a publick Ball in Maſk laſt Night at the Theatre, where ſhe ſupped, and retired from thence as uſual about Twelve. The Chriſtening is to be performed this Evening in the great Hall of the Palace: The Emperor is God-Father, and is to be repreſented by Count Roſenberg. To-morrow the Great Duke will receive the Compliments of the Foreign Miniſters, and his Subjects kiſs his Hand on this Occaſion; after which his Roval Highneſs will dine in Publick, as is his Cuſtom on any great Solemnity, and a great Gala is to be continued for Four Days.
