A Sixty Gun Ship will sail in a few Days to the Rio Janeiro, with several Transport and other Vessels bound to the Brazils. Another Ship of War is under Sailing Orders for Mazagam in Africa.

His Britannick Majesty's Frigate the Aquilon, Captain Onflow, arrived here lately from Port Mahon, and failed on Wednesday last for Cadiz.

*Vienna, February 17.* Yesterday Evening a Courier arrived here from Florence with the News of the Great Dutchess's being safely delivered of a Prince, which produced the most universal and sincere Joy here among all Ranks of People.

A general Order has lately been published, conformable to the one that was given out for the Court last January, to regulate the Mourning throughout her Imperial Majesty's Dominions, fixing the different Periods of each, from the deepest of Six Months to the slightest of a Week; and forbidding entirely the Wearing of Velvet, Damask, or Sattin upon these Occasions, and of Silks and Stuffs of any Kind, that are not the Manufacture of the Country.

The Regiment, that became vacant by the Death of Count Arberg, was given last Monday

to Major General Murray, who is on the Staff in Flanders, and one of the Inspectors of Infantry.

*Bonn, February 22.* The Elector of Treves arrived the 17th, at Five in the Evening, at Mentz: He was lodged in the Palace; he staid there the 18th, and set out the 19th in the Morning for Treves, by the Way of Creutznach and Simmern. The Ceremony of his Installation will be performed the 29th with the greatest Solemnity.

*Brussels, February 23.* Yesterday, early in the Morning, a Courier arrived here from Vienna, with the agreeable News to this Court, that on the 12th Instant the Grand Dutchess of Tuscany was safely delivered of a Prince. At Noon there was a Gala, and a great Dinner at Court; but, it being Lent, there was neither Comedy nor Ball.

His Majesty's Postmaster-General thinks it necessary to give this Public Notice, to all Members of Parliament and others whom it may concern, That by an Act of the Fourth Year of His Majesty's Reign, no Letters or Packets shall be exempted from paying the Duty of Postage, except to or from Members of Parliament during the Sitting of any Sessions of Parliament, or within Forty Days before or Forty Days after any Summons or Prorogation of the same.

From the Dissolution, therefore, of the present Parliament, all Letters and Packets are to be charged with the Duty of Postage, until Forty Days before the Meeting of the new Parliament; from which Time the Letters and Packets to and from the Peers and Lords of Parliament pass Free; and also to and from the Sixteen Peers of Scotland, and to and from each respective Member of the Honourable House of Commons, or 30 Joon after as they may be elected.

By the said Act, printed Votes, or Proceedings in Parliament, or printed News-Papers, being sent without Covers, or in Covers open at the Sides, which shall be signed on the Outside thereof by the Hand of any Member of Parliament, in such Manner as hath been heretofore practised, or which shall be directed to any Member of Parliament at any Place whereof he shall have given Notice in Writing to the Postmaster-General, or to his Deputy at Edinburgh or Dublin respectively, shall be received Free of the Duty of Postage. As this Clause contains no Limitation in point of Time, the Peers and Lords of Parliament may continue to send and receive Free all such printed Papers; and the Sixteen Peers of Scotland, and every Member of the Honourable House of Commons of the new Parliament, from the Time they are elected.

All Persons are desired to take Notice, That as the said Act authorizes certain Clerks in the Offices of the Secretaries of State and in the Post-Office, under certain Restrictions, to Frank such printed Papers, the Postmaster-General has been pleased to give Directions to the Six Clerks of the Roads in this Office, to Frank all such printed Papers as any of the present Sixteen Peers of Scotland, or of the Members of the present House of Commons, have given Notice of in Writing, that no Inconvenience possibly to be avoided may happen to the News-Papers so intended to pass Free: And such Members of the present Parliament, who now permit News-Papers to be addressed to them, are desired, upon their being re-elected, to renew the Notices.
