Westminster, March 10.

**T**HIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to

*An Act for raising a certain Sum of Money, by Way of Annuities, and a Lottery attended with Annuities, to be charged on the Sinking Fund; and for carrying certain Duties on Wines, and on Cyder and Perry, granted by Two Acts of the Third and Sixth Years of the Reign of His present Majesty, to the said Fund.*

*An Act for granting to His Majesty a certain Sum of Money out of the Sinking Fund; and for applying certain Monies, therein mentioned, for the Service of the Year One thousand seven hundred and sixty-eight; and for further appropriating the Supplies granted in this Session of Parliament.*

*An Act for carrying into Execution an Agreement, made between the Mayor and Commonalty and Citizens of the City of London, and the Wardens and Commonalty of the Mystery of Mercers of the said City, and Stamp Brooksbank, Esquire, Secretary to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue of Excise, for the Purchase of Gresham College, and the Ground and Buildings thereunto belonging; and for vesting the same unalienably in the Crown, for the Purpose of erecting and building an Excise-Office there; and for enabling the Lecturers of the said College to marry, notwithstanding any Restriction contained in the Will of Sir Thomas Gresham, Knight, deceased.*

And to Eighteen Private Bills.

After which His Majesty was pleased to make the following most gracious Speech:

*My Lords, and Gentlemen,*

**T**HE Readiness with which you entered into the Views I recommended to you at the Opening of this Session, and the Assiduity with which you have applied yourselves to the Dispatch of the Publick Business, give Me great Satisfac-

tion. At the same Time, the affectionate Concern you have shewn for the Welfare of your Fellow Subjects, by the salutary Laws passed for their Relief in respect to the high Price of Provisions, cannot fail of securing to you their most grateful Regard.

I have nothing new to communicate to you in relation to Foreign Affairs. The apparent Interests of the several Powers in Europe, as well as the express Assurances I have received from them, leave Me no Room to doubt of their Disposition to preserve the general Tranquillity. And, on My Part, you may rest assured, that every Measure that is consistent with the Honour of My Crown, and the Rights of My Subjects, shall be steadily directed to that most salutary Purpose.

*Gentlemen of the House of Commons,*

Your Cheerfulness in granting the necessary Supplies, and your Attention to the Ease of My good Subjects in the Manner of raising them, equally demand my Acknowledgments. I see, with Pleasure, that you have been able to prosecute your Plan for the Diminution of the National Debt, without laying any additional Burthen upon My People.

*My Lords, and Gentlemen,*

As the Time limited by Law for the Expiration of this Parliament now draws near, I have resolved forthwith to issue My Proclamation for dissolving it, and for calling a new Parliament. But I cannot do this, without having first returned you My Thanks, for the many signal Proofs you have given of the most affectionate Attachment to My Person, Family, and Government, the most faithful Attention to the Publick Service, and the most earnest Zeal for the Preservation of Our Excellent Constitution. When, by the vigorous Support which you gave Me during the War, I had been enabled, under the Divine Providence, to restore to My People the Blessings of Peace, you continued to exert yourselves, with equal Alacrity and Steadiness, in pursuing every Measure that could contribute to the Maintenance of the Publick Safety and Tranquillity; which you well understood could no otherwise be preserved, than by establishing, on a respectable Foundation, the Strength, the Credit, and the Commerce of the Nation. The large

large Supplies you have from Time to Time granted, and the wise Regulations you have made for these important Purposes, will, I am persuaded, be found to have been productive of the most beneficial Consequences.

In the approaching Election of Representatives, I doubt not but My People will give Me fresh Proofs of their Attachment to the true Interest of their Country; which I shall ever receive as the most acceptable Mark of their Affection to Me. The Welfare of all My Subjects is My first Object. Nothing therefore has ever given Me more real Concern, than to see any of them, in any Part of My Dominions, attempting to loosen those Bonds of Constitutional Subordination, so essential to the Welfare of the Whole. But it is with much Satisfaction that I now see them returning to a more just Sense of what their own Interest, no less than their Duty, indispensibly requires of them; and thereby giving Me the Prospect of continuing to reign over an happy, because an united People.

Then the Lord Chancellor, by His Majesty's Command, said;

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

*IT is His Majesty's Royal Will and Pleasure, That this Parliament be prorogued to Thursday the Thirty-first of this instant March, to be then here held; and this Parliament is accordingly prorogued to Thursday the Thirty-first of this Instant.*

### A PROCLAMATION,

*For Dissolving this present Parliament, and Declaring the Calling of another.*

GEORGE R.

**W**HEREAS We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to dissolve this present Parliament, which now stands prorogued to Thursday the Thirty-first Day of this Instant March: We do for that End publish this Our Royal Proclamation; and do hereby dissolve the said Parliament accordingly: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are discharged from their Meeting and Attendance on Thursday the said Thirty-first Day of this Instant March. And We being desirous and resolved, as soon as may be, to meet Our People, and to have their Advice in Parliament, do hereby make known to all Our loving Subjects Our Royal Will and Pleasure to call a new Parliament; and do hereby further declare, That, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, We have this Day given Order to Our Chancellor of Great Britain, to issue out Writs in due Form, for calling a new Parliament; which Writs are to bear Teste on Saturday the Twelfth Day of this Instant March, and to be returnable on Tuesday the Tenth Day of May next.

### A PROCLAMATION,

*In Order to the Electing and Summoning the Sixteen Peers of Scotland.*

GEORGE R.

**W**HEREAS We have in Our Council thought fit to declare Our Pleasure for summoning and holding a Parliament of Great Britain, on Tuesday the Tenth Day of May next ensuing the Date hereof: In order therefore to the electing and summoning the Sixteen Peers of Scotland, who are to sit in the House of Peers in the said Parliament; We do by the Advice of Our Privy Council, issue forth this Our Royal Proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to assemble and meet at Holy Rood House in Edinburgh, on Tuesday the Twenty-sixth Day of April next ensuing, between the Hours of Twelve and Two in the Afternoon, to nominate and choose the Sixteen Peers to sit and vote in the House of Peers in the said ensuing Parliament, by open Election and Plurality of Voices of the Peers that shall be then present, and of the Proxies of such as shall be absent (such Proxies being Peers) and producing a Mandate in Writing, duly signed before Witnesses, and both the Constituent and Proxy being qualified according to Law. And the Lord Clerk Register, or such Two of the Principal Clerks of the Session as shall be appointed by him to officiate in his Name, are hereby respectively required to attend such Meeting, and to administer the Oaths required by Law to be taken there by the said Peers, and to take their Votes; and immediately after such Election made, and duly examined, to certify the Names of the Sixteen Peers so elected, and sign and attest the same, in the Presence of the said Peers the Electors, and return such Certificate into Our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain. And We do, by this Our Proclamation, strictly command and require the Provost of Edinburgh, and all other the Magistrates of the said City, to take especial Care to preserve the Peace thereof, during the Time of the said Election; and to prevent all Manner of Riots, Tumults, Disorders, and Violence whatsoever. And We strictly charge and command, That this Our Royal Proclamation be duly published at the Market Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the County Towns of Scotland, Twenty-five Days at least before the Time hereby appointed for the Meeting of the said Peers to proceed to such Election.

Witness Ourself at Westminster, the Eleventh Day of March, One thousand seven hundred and sixty-eight, in the Eighth Year of Our Reign.

*Constantinople, February 1.* On Tuesday last  
M. Dedel, Ambassador from their High Mighti-  
nesses the States General, died at his Country-  
House at Bujukdere, where he had suffered a  
painful and tedious Illness for some Months;  
and he was buried on Saturday at Beghoglu near  
Pera, the usual Burying-Place of the Francks,  
with the accustomed Formalities.

*Naples, February 16.* His Sicilian Majesty  
still remains at Caserta, but proposes to set out  
on the 25th Instant for Capriati, about 60 Miles  
from Naples, near the Confines of the Pope's  
Dominions.

*Florence, February 27.* The Great Dutches  
and the young Prince continue perfectly well.  
For three Days successively the different Classes  
of Ladies have been admitted to kiss her Hand  
in Bed; and her Royal Highness has now be-  
gun to get up for an Hour or two every Day.

*Copenhagen, February 27.* Baron de Vinck,  
who was lately appointed his Prussian Majesty's  
Envoy to this Court, arrived here a few Days  
ago; and Yesterday had his first Audience of  
his Majesty. At the same Time Baron Borcke,  
whom M. de Vinck succeeds, had his Audience  
of *Levee*, and proposes soon to set out for Berlin.

*Paris, March 3.* By a Regulation lately re-  
vised here, no Foreigner will be suffered to de-  
part out of this Kingdom, without a Passport  
from the Ambassador or Minister of their Na-  
tion.

*Hague, March 8.* This being the Anniver-  
sary of the Prince of Orange's Birth-day, on  
which he enters into the Twenty-first Year of  
his Age, his Serene Highness received the Com-  
pliments as usual upon the Occasion; and Prince  
Lewis of Brunswick gives a grand Entertain-  
ment to the Prince and Princess of Orange,  
and a numerous Company of the Foreign Mi-  
nisters, and other Persons of Distinction; And  
this Evening their Highnesses will appear at the  
French Theatre.
