Copenhagen, March 2.

MR. Titley, who for Forty Years had resided here as His Britannick Majesty's Minister and Envoy Extraordinary, but who had retired for some Time from publick Business to a Place called Lyngbye near this City, died there on the 27th of last Month, as universally lamented as he had always been deservedly beloved and respected; and on the 8th instant was interred: His Funeral, agreeable to his own Directions, was attended only by the Ministers of the Council, the Grand Veneur, and Mr. Gunning, His Britannick Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary.

Copenhagen, March 5. An Ordonance is just published, prohibiting the Importation of all foreign Stone or Earthen Ware into the Dutchies of Sleswig and Holstein, under the Pain of Confiscation.

Copenhagen, March 8. The Marshal Holck was invested with the Order of Dannebrogge on the 5th instant.

Vienna, March 2. The Earthquake, which we had here on the 27th of last Month, was not so sensibly felt at Presbourg as in this City; but, as it was stronger at Newstadt, about three Posts from hence, in the Road to Italy, it is imagined it came to us from that Part of the World. There is scarce a House at Newstadt that has not suffered more or less, and the Royal Military Academy there has been so much damaged, that it is computed the Repairs will amount to 30,000 Florins at least. There is no Account of any Lives having been lost. It was computed by the Astronomer of the Jesuits College here, who was at that Instant in the Observatory, that the Earthquake lasted with us Thirty Seconds, in which Time, he says, he felt more than an Hundred Shocks.

As the Waters are greatly sunk here since Monday, and there is no more Appearance of Ice, they have begun to repair those Parts of the Bridges over the different Branches of the Danube near this City, that have been carried away by the Ice, and the Rapidity of the Current; so that in a few Days our Communication on that Side will be again open.

Dresden, March 6. Yesterday having been the Elector's Name-Day, there was a very splendid Gala at this Court. The whole Electoral Family dined under a Canopy of State, waited upon by the Principal Officers of the Electorate, as has been practised these three Years past on like Occasions; and in the Evening there was a numerous Drawing-Room in the grand Apartments of the Palace. Some Promotions were likewise made, the most considerable of which was that of Chevalier Henry Bruhl, third Son to the late Minister of that Name, who was declared Adjutant General to the Elector.

By the last Letters from Vienna, we are informed, that an Earthquake happened there on the 27th of last Month, and that several Bridges on the Danube and Moldau were demolished by the great Bodies of Ice impetuously rushing

down those Rivers. The Bridge of this Capital was observed to tremble from the same Cause; but by the Goodness of its Architecture it withstood the Concussion. On the same Day a slight Shock of an Earthquake was felt at Bischoffswerder, on the Confines of Lusatia, and in the Neighbourhood of Freyberg; likewise on the Day abovementioned several new Openings and large Rents were discovered towards the Declivities and about the Feet of those Mountains; without, however, any previous sensible Motion of the Earth.
