Naples, March 1.

ON the 23d of last Month his Sicilian Majesty went to Capriati, to take the Diversion of Hunting there for some Days; but is expected to return again to Caserta on Saturday next the 5th Instant.

It is now imagined that the future Queen of Naples will arrive here about the 18th of May; and that the Marriage of his Sicilian Majesty will take Place at that Time.

Lisbon, March 5. Their most Faithful Majesties and the Royal Family returned on Wednesday last from Salvaterra to Ajuda, when the Marshal Count of Schaumbourg Lippe took his Leave of the King: His Majesty made him a Present of a Button and Loop for his Hat, of a very great Value.

Vienna, March 9. Baron Metternich, who had his Audiences here last Week, to notify Prince Clement's Election, is gone to Presbourg for the same Purpose: And Count Palfi, one of the Six Chamberlains who constantly attend the Emperor, will set out in a few Days to compliment his Electoral Highness on that Occasion. Count Bethlem, Son-in-Law to Count Kevenhuller, and Grand Master to the Duke and Dutchess of Saxe-Teschen, died here last Friday, where he was come to consult the Physicians.

Inoculation has at last prevailed here. A young English Student in Physick, of the Name of Houlston, who came here to attend the famous De Haen's Lectures, has associated himself with a Physician of this Place; and with the Leave, and under the Protection of Baron Van Swieten, they have inoculated four Children in the Hospitals, one of whom is already perfectly recovered; and it is not doubted, but that this Practice will be generally adopted, and attended with the same Success here, as it has been in other Places.

Marquis Montecuculli, the Modenese Minister, received, on his Knees, this Day, from the Emperor, with the usual Formalities, the Investiture of the Duchy of Modena, &c. for the Duke his Master.

General O'Donel set out Yesterday to take Possession of his Government of Transilvania, to which he was appointed some Months since.

Bern, March 12. The Post from Geneva is this Instant arrived, by which we are informed, that Peace is happily restored to that Republick; the Plan of Arrangement and Conciliation having been approved Yesterday in the Council General by a Majority of 1203 against 23.

Ratisbon, March 17. The Earthquake, which was felt at Vienna pretty violently on the 27th of last Month, at Half past Two in the Morning, was also sensibly felt here nearly at the same Time; in many Parts of Bavaria much more sensibly; and even shattered some Walls

and Buildings in the Country. It was remarkable, that in the Town of Munich it was not felt at all.

We hear from Munich, that till very lately, the Fall of Snow had been so very great thereabouts, that, instead of the common Carriages of the Country, People were obliged to travel in Sledges, a Thing scarcely ever known before at this Season of the Year.

Brussels, March 22. Saturday last, being the Emperor's Name Day, there was a Grand Gala at Court: In the Morning his Royal Highness went in great State to the Church of St. Gedeule, where Te Deum was sung. Upon his Return he received the Compliments of the Nobility and Foreign Ministers; and at One o'Clock dined in Publick; and was served by the Great Officers of the Court, and the Chamberlains in Waiting. In the Evening there was a Drawing Room.

The same Day there was a Number of idle riotous People assembled themselves together, and by Force carried away every Thing that was brought into the publick Markets, declaring that they would rather be hanged than starved; but upon the Guards being called, and a Gallows immediately erected upon the Great Place, they soon dispersed: Every Thing is now in perfect Quietness; and the Government is taking every Precaution to prevent the like Disturbances for the future.

Whereas on Monday the 7th Day of this Instant March, William Odgers, one of the Officers of His Majesty's Customs at Penzance in the County of Cornwall, was, in the due Execution of his Office, in seizing and securing a large Quantity of uncustomed Goods, most cruelly and barbarously murdered by Melchisedeck Kinsman, Richard Trenear, David Trenear, and Richard Peters, all of them Timmers, belonging to the Parish of Gvennop in the said County of Cornwall, and who were assembled for the Purpose of rescuing the said Goods; the said Melchisedeck Kinsman, with a large Whip, the Head of which was cased with Copper, giving the said William Odgers several mortal Wounds, of which Wounds the said William Odgers languished till the 11th Instant, and then died; and the said Richard Trenear, David Trenear, and Richard Peters being present, aiding and abetting the said Melchisedeck Kinsman to commit the said Murder.
