YESTERDAY died Count Lowenhielm, the President of the Chancery.

Warsaw, March 9. The Death of the late Great General of Lithuania has made Room for many Promotions: Count Oginski, Palatine of Wilna, is declared Great General of Lithuania: Prince Radzivil made Palatine of Wilna in his Place: Count Oginski, Great Marshal of Lithuania, made Castellain of Wilna: Prince Sangusko, Vice-Marshal, made Great Marshal; and the Marquis de Wielopolski, Vice Marshal de la Couronne, in the Place of Count Mniszeck, who has resigned.

Copenhagen, March 15. Yesterday being the first Time of her Majesty's appearing in Public since her Lying-in, it was observed as a Day of Gala: The Foreign Ministers, Nobility, &c. had the Honor of paying their Respects to her Majesty upon the Occasion; and in the Evening there was a Ball and Supper at Court.

Florence, March 15. A few Days ago arrived here Baron Neny, Secretary of the Order of the Golden Fleece, the Ensigns of which he has brought for the young Prince: The Ceremony of investing him with it is to be performed next Saturday the 19th Instant with great Pomp: It is the Emperor's Name-Day, and on which the Ceremony of Churching the Great Dutches is likewise to be performed. Their Royal Highnesses are afterwards to dine in Publick; and in the Evening there will be a Drawing-Room at Court. There was a Gala at Court on the 13th, being the Emperor's Birth-Day, on which Occasion the Great Duke received the Compliments of the Foreign Ministers, and admitted his Subjects to kiss his Hand as usual.

Bern, March 16. By the last Letters from Geneva we are informed, that on Sunday last Mess. Lullin de Chateaufieux, Francis Fatio, John Lewis Grenus, and J. J. Bonnet, were elected Syndicks of that Republick; and that the Election was carried on with great Unanimity and Decency.

Hague, March 26. The Inhabitants of the Village of Petten upon this Coast, not far from Texel, having been guilty of great Excesses with regard to the Crew and Landing of the Ship Elizabeth Dorothea, belonging to the Dutch East India Company, and which was cast away off that Place in the End of November last,

a great Number of them were apprehended; and this Morning twenty-three of them were put upon the Scaffold here, nine of whom were whipped, and the whole Band are to be banished by Sentence of the Court of Holland.

His Serene Highness the Prince of Weilbourg and his Children are perfectly recovered of the Small Pox, under the Care of the English Inoculators, who have been called to Rotterdam by several of the principal Inhabitants.

Whereas on Monday the 7th Day of this Instant March, William Odgers, one of the Officers of His Majesty's Customs at Penzance in the County of Cornwall, was, in the due Execution of his Office, in seizing and securing a large Quantity of uncustomed Goods, most cruelly and barbarously murdered by Melchisedeck Kinsman, Richard Trenear, David Trenear, and Richard Peters, all of them Tinkers, belonging to the Parish of Gwenzop in the said County of Cornwall, and who were assembled for the Purpose of rescuing the said Goods; the said Melchisedeck Kinsman, with a large Whip, the Head of which was cased with Copper, giving the said William Odgers several mortal Wounds, of which Wounds the said William Odgers languished till the 11th Instant, and then died; and the said Richard Trenear, David Trenear, and Richard Peters being present, aiding and abetting the said Melchisedeck Kinsman to commit the said Murder.
