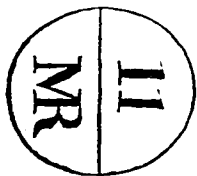

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That her Grace the Dutches of Northumberland received, on Friday the 11th of March last, at her Grace's House at Charing-Cross, in a Cover, directed as hereunder. and which had the Marks of the General Post Offices both of Dublin and London upon it, a threatening Letter, containing the Words, Letters, and Figures following, viz.

“ Date this from Dublin, Yet will I be over long

“ and shall know whether you deal cadidly with
“ me or not. Please to leave the above as directed
“ on the 1st of April next, otherwise abide the Con-
“ sequences.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the Writing and Sending the said threatening Letter to the said Dutches of Northumberland, as above-mentioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually wrote the said Letter) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices in the said Fact, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

Whereas on Monday the 7th Day of this Instant March, William Odgers, one of the Officers of His Majesty's Customs at Penzance in the County of Cornwall, was, in the due Execution of his Office, in ſeizing and securing a large Quantity of uncuſtomed Goods, most cruelly and barbarously murdered by Melchisedeck Kinsman, Richard Trenear, David Trenear, and Richard Peters, all of them Tinnors, belonging to the Parish of Gwenop in the said County of Cornwall, and who were assembled for the Purpose of rescuing the said Goods; the said Melchisedeck Kinsman, with a large Whip, the Head of which was cased with Copper, giving the said William Odgers several mortal Wounds, of which Wounds the said William Odgers languished till the 11th Instant, and then died; and the said Richard Trenear, David Trenear, and Richard Peters being present, aiding and abetting the said Melchisedeck Kinsman to commit the said Murder.

The Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, in order to bring the said Offenders to Justice, do hereby promise a Reward of One Hundred Pounds to any Person or Persons who shall apprehend, or cause to be apprehended, any or either of the said Offenders; to be paid by the Receiver General of His Majesty's Customs upon Conviction.

David Trenear, a well-set made Man, about 5 Feet 8 Inches high, and about Thirty Years of Age, marked a little with the Small-Pox, a brown Complexion and black Hair.

Richard Peters, a slight Man, about 5 Feet 10 Inches high, aged about Forty Years, a fallow meagre Complexion, with black Hair.
