

Whitehall, April 23, 1768.

Whereas it hath been humbly represented to the King, That notwithstanding the great Pains which have of late been taken, and the well adapted Plan which the most Principal of the Manufacturers in Spitalfields are at this Time vigorously pursuing for the Benefit of the Journeymen in every Branch of the Trade, yet a great Number of evil disposed Persons, armed with Pistols, Cutlasses, and other offensive Weapons, and in Disguise, assembled themselves together about the Hour of Twelve in the Night of the 14th Day of April Instant, and forcibly entered the Dwelling-Houses and Shops of several Journeymen Weavers residing in and near Spitalfields aforesaid, and, after putting them in corporal Fear and Danger of their Lives, cut to Pieces and destroyed the Silk-Works then manufacturing in Sixteen different Looms there, belonging to Mess. Phipps and Everard, of Artillery-Lane, the Damage whereof amounts nearly to the Sum of Two Hundred Pounds upon the most moderate Computation: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said Outrages, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one or more of them, who shall discover his or their Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
