Whitehall, April 30, 1768.

IT being His Majesty's Royal Intention, that the Parliament, which is summoned to meet on Tuesday the 10th Day of May next, should then meet and sit; The King has been pleased to direct a Commission to pass the Great Seal, appointing and authorising his Royal Highness the Duke of Gloucester, his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland, Thomas Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, and other Lords, to open and hold the said Parliament on the said 10th Day of May next, being the Day of the Return of the Writs of Summons.

Vienna, April 9. On the 7th Instant, the Day appointed for the Marriage of her Royal Highness the Archduchess Charlotte with his Majesty the King of the Two Sicilies, the Imperial Court went to the Church of the Augustine Friars in this City, through the Gallery that leads thereto from the Palace. The Gallery was lined all the Way with a double Row of Grenadiers: The Porch and Staircase through which they came down to the Church, were lined on one Side by the Archer-Guards, and on the other by the Life-Guards on Foot, who were also lining the End of the Choir near the Church, which was adorned with rich Tapestry-Hangings, the Pillars being covered, from their Bases to their Chapiters, with Carpets of Crimson Damask, trimmed with Gold Lace and Fringes. Near the great Altar stood a Canopy, under which were two Chairs of State for their Imperial Majesties. Not far from the Canopy, and on the same Line, were other Chairs for the Imperial Family; facing the Altar an Estrade, with two Chairs of State, for his Royal Highness the Archduke Ferdinand, charged with the King of Naples's Procuration, to take, in his Majesty's Name, the Archduchess in Marriage; and a little behind him, on the Right Hand, a Pew for the Duke of St. Elizabeth, the Sicilian Ambassador. The Ladies that have their free Admittance at Court, came at Half an Hour past Eleven, to place themselves in the Left

Part of the Choir, and the Court arrived there at Twelve o'Clock, in the following Order:

The Pages, the Noblemen of the Kitchen, the Chambellans, the State Counsellors, the Knights of the Order of St. Stephen, those of the Military Order of Maria Theresa, the Commandeurs of the first of those Orders, the Commandeurs of the last, the Grand-Croix of the first, those of the other, the Knights of the Golden Fleece, the King of Naples's Ambassador, the Duke of Saxe Teschen, the Archdukes, his Imperial Majesty, escorted by the Captains of the Guards and Grand Officers, as also her Majesty the Empress Queen, and the future Queen of Naples, her Daughter, on her Right Hand, dressed in a Suit of Silver Cloth, the Countess of Lerchenfeld, Grand Maitresse of her Royal Highness, bearing the Train of her Gown. Their Royal Highnesses the Archduchesses followed their Majesties, and the Ladies of the Court ended the Retinue, which was closed by a Detachment of the Life Guards on Foot.

As soon as their Imperial Majesties were seated under their Canopy, the Archduke Ferdinand and the Archduchess took their Seats facing the Altar: After the Blessing of the Wedding-Rings, performed by M. Visconti, the Pope's Nuntio, assisted by many Bishops, or Mitred Abbots, and of the Court Clergy, their Royal Highnesses advanced themselves to the Altar, and the same Prelate gave them the Nuptial Benediction with the usual Ceremonies: After which he begun the Te Deum, which was sung by the Music of the Imperial Chapel, during the Firing of two Vollies of the Cannon of the Ramparts, and of the Musquetry of one Battalion. Then the Court returned to the Palace in the same Order as they went, the Empress Queen leading always her Daughter the Queen of Naples.

After that Ceremony, the Neapolitan Ambassador had his Audience of Leave from their Imperial Majesties, and from their Royal Highnesses the Archdukes and Archduchesses. The young Queen dressed herself in a travelling Habit, dined in private with her august Mother, from whom she took her Leave, and passed, at half past Three, through the grand Apartments, conducted by the Archduke Ferdinand, who

handed her into the Coach, being attended as in her going to Church. The Grief that appeared on her Majesty's Face was too strong a Testimony of what had passed between her and her tender Mother, not to sensibly affect the whole Court.

Detachments of the Noble German and Hungarian Guards, with their Officers and Trumpets at their Head, were ranged on the Place of the Court: A Party of the Foot-Guards, with their Officers, formed there two Lines. The Guards and Grand Guard beat the March, and a Detachment of Dragoons preceded her Sicilian Majesty, who went out of Town attended as follows:

Three Postillions blowing their Horns. A Coach and Six for the Count de Paar, Grand Post-Master. An Officer of the Post-Office on Horseback. A Coach and Six for Four Chambellans of the Court. Another for the Marshal Count de Pallaviciny, (appointed Ambassador and Plenipotentiary from their Imperial Majesties, for conducting and delivering the Queen of Naples to the King her Spouse) for the Count de Schaffgotsch, Grand Master, and for Two Chambellans. Her Majesty's own Coach and Six, with two Court Postillions, in which was the Queen, with the Countess de Paar as her Grand Maitresse: Four of the Noble German Guards, a Messenger of State, and two Court Postillions, followed the Coach on Horseback. Two other Coaches and six for the Countess de Schaffgotsch and Four Ladies of the Court. Another Detachment of Dragoons closed the March.

At her Majesty's passing through the Streets, they were lined with Citizens under Arms, and the whole Body of the Magistrates were assembled in the Square called Stock am Eisen; all the Streets and Suburbs, through which her Majesty passed, were crowded with Spectators, and occupied by Troops both of Horse and Foot. She was saluted at her going out by the Cannon of the Rampart, and the Musquetry of one Battalion ranged on the Bastion facing the Court. The Emperor, who was set out before, has accompanied the Queen to Neustadt, from whence he came back Yesterday Noon.

On the 5th, 6th, and 7th Instant were sent from hence the Things necessary for the Journey of the Queen of Naples to the Frontiers of that Kingdom.

Bern, April 10. The Town of Neuschatel submitted, on Thursday last, to the two Sentences given here some Time ago in Favour of the King of Prussia.

Madrid, April 11. The Court removed from hence to Aranjuez the 6th Instant.

Florence, April 12. On Easter-day the Great Duke and Dutchess went in State to the Church of the Annunciation: They afterwards dined in Publick, and in the Evening there was a Drawing-Room at Court. His Royal Highness made a Present that Evening to Baron Neny (who had

been sent with the Toison d'Or for the young Prince) of his Picture set in Diamonds, with which he appeared at Court, and the next Morning he sat out on his Return to Vienna. The first Convoy of the Queen of Naples's Baggage arrived here a few Days ago, and proceeded directly towards Naples. Dispositions are making here for her Reception: But in the mean Time the Great Duke and Dutchess, with a small Company appointed by them, are gone into the Country, where they propose to stay till the 16th Instant. On the 25th they are to go to meet the Queen of Naples on the Confines of this State, where Count Rosenberg is to entertain the whole Court.

Florence, April 16. Yesterday arrived here the Count d'Aquilar, the Spanish Ambassador from Turin, who is to wait for the Arrival of the Queen of Naples, in order to present to her the rich Presents in Jewels that the King of Spain makes her upon her Marriage. The Great Dutchess has likewise prepared a very elegant as well as costly Present of the same Kind for her Sister-in-Law, consisting of a Bouquet of Diamonds for the Breast.

Leghorn, April 15. At the Desire of Sir John Dick, Bart. His Britannick Majesty's Consul, and of the British Factory here, Edward Purnell, Esq; is to act as Consul during that Gentleman's Absence.

Copenhagen, April 16. Count Scheel, some Time since nominated to replace M. d'Affebourg at the Court of Petersbourg, has had his Audience of Leave; on which Occasion he was invested with the Order of Dannebrog.
