Copenhagen, March 31. HE 11 of the next Month will be held general Rendezvous of our Forces near Elschore; the other night a Specisth Party passed the Sound, and thought to have burnt the provision of Hay and Straw that hath been made there for the use of the Army, but they failed in their design. In the mean time here are firange and various discourses concerning the Treafons that are charged upon the Chancellor Griffenfelt, which we shall ere long know the truth of, for it's faid, his Majesty intends him a publick Try-The other day certain Instruments were carried into the Castle, which are made use for the wracking of Criminals; and this makes people think, that the Chancellor may be put to it; most people believe that his Crime must have been very great, that the King is fo

highly incenfed against him.

The Emperor hath declared the Rienna, March 29. Duke Adolphus of Holftein, and the Marquis of Baden Dourlach, Marefchals de Camp of his Armies, though the former will continue to ferve the King of Denmark, and the latter in the command of General-of the Troops of the Circles. His Imperial Majesty has likewise given the command of the right Wing of his Cavalry to the Duke of Saxen Lamenburg, and that of the lest Wing to the Count de Caprara; adding to the former, the Regiment of the Duke de Boufnonville, who goes to command the Spanish Forces in Casalonia. The 24 instant, the Marquis of Bidga Dourlach parted hence, in great diligence for Hailbron, where is to be held the general Rendezvons of the Troops of the Empire: The Count de Cugrara, and the Count d Arch, General of the Artillery, are likewise parted from hence. In the mean time, great quantities of Coin are daily transported from theidlereditary Countreys, towards Francfort, Strush ng, &c. for the subsistence of the Imperial Army this Campagne, and, it's faid, that the Count de Caplieres, the Commissary General, hach signified thicker, that he hack already made a provision sufficient to maintain the Emperors Forces five or, fix Months. The Bishop of Gurck, the chief of the Embaffy defigned from hence to Nimeguen, will go to the Army very suddenlys in order to his continuing his journey from thence, according to the likelihood there fliall, be of forming the Congress. The Empress continues extreme ill, so that we have not any hopes of her recovery. The Empress Dowager is going to Niclasbourg, to vilit the Queen Dowager of Poland, who has been ill'of the Small

Estingen, April 3. Prince Herman of Baden having received advice, that the French were putting themselves into sposture to relieve Bhilipsburg, gave on the 3 past, the necessary orders for the drawing together lich. Troops as are quartered in the parts adjatent; that passing the Rhine, and joining such as are posted on that fide, they might be able to oppose the design of the Enemy. The same day, viz. the 31, arrived at Lauterburg, two great Boatsladen with Hay and Oated

and other Provisions from Strasburg; and the day following, likewise arrived there 100 Wagons with the fame lading from the Dutchy of Wirtemberg, fo that our Troops have sufficiently wherewithal to subsilt; till sich time as they may find Forage in the Fields "This day the Duke of Lorrain arrived here, upon the advice that had been given by the Prince of Baden, of the intention of the Enemy to fuecor Philipsburg. " And this night or to morrow morning early, he will march with the Troops that have affembled here to Lauter-

burg, to pais the Rhine there, and observe the Enemy. Strasburg, April 3. The first instant the Duke of Luxemburg arrived at Saverne ? bringing swith him four Resiments, viz. That of Enguien, Condesta Ferte, and Champagne, and yesterday he marched from Saverne, with 6000 Men, and fix pieces of Cannon to Haguender, where stand ready several Wagons laden with Provisions, which the will Convoy to Philipsburg : At the fame time the Mareschal de Rochefort is marched with a Body of Horfe onely, by the way of the Mountain. towards Berg Laberne, to get into Philipsburg on that fife. Handhurg, April 7. From Berlin ofthe 29 past they writes that all preparations was making for the general Rendezvous of the Forces of the Elector of Brandenburg on the La instant; That the Velt Marefchal Dorfling, who had been very much indisposed, was pretty well recovered ; and that the Count of Storoberg, the Imperial Brivoy was parted from Berlinx on his Brrand to the King of Denmaik; and the Dukes of Lunenburg. Here was a report some days fince, that the Brandenburgs had retaken the firging Passof Lothenits, but it meets not with my creait. The third instant, five Imperial Companies, who have had their quarters near this City, passed the Elbe, and are marched towards Bremer your de, where will be held to morrow a Rondezvous of the Forces of the Allies. We cannot yet certainly learn whether they will besiege States or onely block it up for the present. The Duke of Holstein Gotnorp continues still here From Gegenhagen they advise feveral particulars, concerning the Treason, of Griffenfest, and others, which we know not what credit to give yet,

Antegre, April 6. We have certain advice of the arrival of the Spanish Gallions in Spain, and that they have brought home as well for account of the King, as of particular Merchants, about 25 Millions of Pieces of Fight.

Bruffels, April 10. Last night arrived the Spanish Ordinary, and brings the confirmination of the arrival of the Galions at St. Lugar, to the great joy of many people, who have concerns, there. The French Troops march to and tro on our Frontiers, without that we can as yet discover what their deis; however his Excellency having fome apprehensions that they may attack Chinlemont, has ordered the Burgundian Regiment to march thither from Namur. On the feventh instant, 8000 French, drawn from Aeth and Oudensed, marched in great diligenco towards Cande, and by fresher advices we understand, that they have fince directed their march towards Guife. This day or to morrow the Prince of Orange will be at the Rendezeous of his Troopy as, Rajandael confifting in 40000 Men from whonce we expect he will in x or 4 days march to Duffelt near Malines, We are in expechasion of hearing of some action by our next Letters from Alfair, for those we receive this morning give an accounts, that the Duker of Larnain had passed the Rhine at Lauterbung with 8000 Men, and was marching comards Haguenaws to meet and fight the Duke of Linxemburg, who was marching with 6000 Men from Savetne rowards Philipsburg, in order to the puning a succer into that place. People here will needs have it, that incesting death of the filectres of Bouris unities hat placedly been oblighted a great alteration is the disposition of that Court in fayor of the Emperors and the Allies. It is certainly faid, that the Treath beween the Emperor and the Duke of Manyhurg is concluded a mod that his Highnely is going to make a flep to Vienna, where, we are rold, his fon, the Remoto & Newburgais likewife expected in his reeurd From Sulf.

Hgue, April 10. This morning early, his Highness is pared towards Researched, the place appointed for the Rendezwous of his Troops, where, it's said, he will be to mornow; his Highness will have a very considerable Army, and intends to be lodged with it on the 15 or 16 instant at Dussels hear Malines. The 7 instant the Sieur Montaigne sailed out of the Texel, in the ship appointed to transport him to Goit. noting, he being charged with the Ratisscation of this States of the Treaty of Commerce concluded some Months since with the Crown of Suedin. The Sieur Tromp will now in few days part hence for Demant, to be Admiral of the Fleet of that King this Summer, and in order thereunto the States have dispensed him from the Oath of Obedience and Fidelity, he has formerly taken to this State, during this Campagne. Our Letters from Demant speak very obscurely concerning the matters charged wpon the Chancellor Grissenicit, and others concerned with him, but here people talk more freely, and do not slick to charge the Chancellor, and some other persons of the greatest Quality in that Kingdom, with Treasons of the highest nature, viz against the Kings person and safety. Certain it is, that the King is extremely incensed against the Chancellor: for besides the consistant of his Goods, and the taking from him the Order of the Elephant, has degraded him of his Homour of Count, and his name of Grissenselves.

Paris, April 11. On Thursday last, the French and Suisse guards marched hence, and the rest of the Troops of the Kings Housshold are to follow on Monday next. His Majesty it's believed will likewise set out some time the next week, but whither it will be towards Flanders or towards Germany we do not yet know. On Wednesday last the Prince of Conde came to Town, and the next day went to St Germain, to wait on his Majesty at his rising; that whole day he continued at Court, and assisted at a Councel of War, that was held in his Majesties presence. Here is lately arrived Signior Varese. Extraordinary Nuncio of the Pope, he hash been visited by the Ministers of this Court, but hath not as yet been admitted to his Audience of the King. It is said here, that the Duke of Newburg hath made a Treaty with Spain, and that y virtue of it, he is to assist the Spanish Netherlands with several Troo, 5 this Campagne. The Duke of Luxemburg, who is actived in Assistance, as it's said, positive order to put a Convoy into Philiphingh. Three days since we had the news of the arrival of the Spanish Galions.
