Stockholm, April 29.

YESTERDAY the Anniversary of the King of Sweden's Orders was celebrated in the usual Manner; but his Majesty not having held any previous Chapter, none of the Vacancies were filled up; and there are now four Blue Ribbons vacant, besides several Commanderies of the Two Orders.

Berlin, May 6. On Wednesday the King of Prussia arrived in perfect Health at Charlottenbourg; and, after reviewing the Regiments in this Garrison, returned Yesterday to Potsdam.

Copenhagen, May 7. The King of Denmark, accompanied only by Count Holke, left this City Yesterday Morning, about Eleven o'Clock, and his Majesty proposed lying at Corfoer. In Case the Winds prove favourable for passing the two Belts, he will be at Sleswick To-morrow Night. His Majesty was preceded by Count Bernstorff, the Grand Marshal Molke, M. During in Quality of Aide de Camp, M. Bulow as Equerry, M. Schoemaker his Private Secretary, and two others of the Chancery, who, together with M. de Schimmelman, are to form his Retinue in the intended Journey.

Hague, May 13. Great Preparations are making at Amsterdam against the 30th of this Month, on which Day the Prince and Princess of Orange are expected there with a Retinue of near an hundred Persons.

His Serene Highness Prince Frederick of Hesse-Cassel, who lately entered into the Dutch Service as Major General of Horse, is appointed Colonel of a Regiment of Dragoons, of which Major General Dittfourth was Colonel.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That on Tuesday Night the 10th Instant, the House of Edward Russel, in the Borough of Southwark, Dissiler, was violently attacked by several Persons unknown, who, by many outrageous Acts, did considerable Damage to his Property, and threatened his Life, and to burn down his House: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in those heinous Crimes, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon, and also a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplices therein, so that they, or any of them, may be apprehended and convicted thereof; the said Reward of Two Hundred Pounds to be paid by the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, upon the Conviction of any one or more of the Offenders.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That the Front of the House of Richard Capel, Esq; at Bermondsey in Southwark, was, on Tuesday the 10th Instant, demolished by a Mob of People unlawfully, riotously, and tumultuously assembled together, to the Disturbance of the Publick Peace; that the said Richard Capel has got a large Contusion on his Arm, occasioned by a Blow from a Stone or Brickbat thrown at him, at the Time abovementioned; and that his Life is threatened: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said outrageous and unlawful Acts, does hereby promise His most gracious Pardon, and also a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof; the said Reward of Two Hundred Pounds to be paid by the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, upon the Conviction of any one or more of the Offenders.
