Westminster, May 21.

THIS Day, the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molineux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by Virtue of His Majesty's Commission, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read;* and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, the Duke of Northumberland, Lord Weymouth, Lord Lovel and Holland, Lord Harwich, and several other Lords therein mentioned, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to,

An Act for further continuing certain Laws to prohibit, for a limited Time, the Exportation of Corn, Grain, Meal, Malt, Flour, Bread, Biscuit, and Starch; and also the Extraction of Low Wines and Spirits from Wheat and Wheat-Flour; for further allowing the Importation of Wheat, and Wheat-Flour, Barley, Barley-Meal, and Pulse, free of Duty, into this Kingdom, from any Part of Europe; and for allowing the Importation of Oats, and Oat-Meal, Rye, and Rye-Meal, into this Kingdom, for a limited Time, free of Duty; and also for continuing such other Laws as will expire before the Beginning of the next Session of Parliament.

And to One Private Bill.

Westminster, May 21.

LAST Night the Corpse of her late Royal Highness the Princess Louisa-Anne was carried from Carlton-House to the Prince's Chamber, where the Body lay in State this Day, and will be privately interred, about Ten o'Clock at Night, in the Royal Vault in King Henry the Seventh's Chapel.

Dublin Castle, May 12.

THIS Day his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant went in State to the House of Peers, and being seated on the Throne with the usual Ceremony, his Excellency sent for the Commons, and gave the Royal Assent to the following Bills;

An Act to amend and explain an Act passed in the Ninth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, An Act for the Relief of Insolvent Debtors.

An Act to continue, amend, and make more effectual, an Act passed in the Fourth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the First, intituled, An Act for vesting in His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, the several Lands, Tenements, and Hereditaments, whereon the Barracks

in this Kingdom are built, or building, or contracted for, and whereon Light-Houses are or shall be built; and for making reasonable Satisfaction to the several Owners and Proprietors for the same: And also, an Act passed in the 21st Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the Second, intituled, An Act for amending and making more effectual the said former Act: And likewise to enable the present Commissioners of the Barrack-Board, and their Successors, to sell the several Estates in the Lands whereon Barracks have been built, that are now gone to Decay, or shall hereafter become uselefs, and also to sell the Materials of such decayed Barracks.

An Act for further amending an Act passed in the 31st Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, intituled, An Act for making a wide and convenient Way, Street, and Passage from Essex Bridge to the Castle of Dublin, and for other Purposes therein mentioned.

An Act to amend an Act made the last Session of Parliament, for the erecting and establishing Public Infirmaries or Hospitals in this Kingdom.

An Act for explaining and amending an Act passed in the Second Year of His Majesty King George the First, intituled, An Act for the real Union and Division of Parishes, and for other Purposes therein mentioned.

An Act to explain and amend an Act, intituled, An Act for repairing the Roads leading from the City of Corke, through Mill Street, to Shannah Mill in the County of Kerry, and from Shannah Mill to Killarney; as also from Shannah Mill, through Castle Island, to Listowell in the said County; and for laying an additional Toll, at all Turnpikes in this Kingdom, on all Cays and Carriages, making the Use of any Part of Sappling or Trees, as for Bow or Backband, or making Use of any Sapplings twisted into Gads for Backbands, Halters, Traces to draw by, or Gads commonly called Long Gads.

An Act for making and repairing the Road from the Town of Listowell in the County of Kerry, through the Lands of Listowell, Drumin, Skehanireen, Bunegarab, Killmeany, Curraphllog, Knockenure, Liffenisky, and Binanaspig, in the County of Kerry, Atea Taunpleatlea, Glanagour, Knockfinish, Carrigkeery, Glanduff, Glannastare, Ballyline, Ardagh Commons, Ardagh-Town, Liffhilleen, otherwise Lisbireen, Skehana, Killcannell, and Reens, in the County of Limerick, ending at the Forge on the said Lands of Reens, at the Turn of the Road leading to Newcastle from Rathkeale in the said County of Limerick.

An Act to explain and amend the Laws made for the better supplying the City of Dublin with Corn and Flour.

An Act for altering, amending, explaining, and rendering more effectual, an Act made in the 9th Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, intituled, An Act for repairing the Road leading from the Bridge, commonly called Ban-Bridge, over the Ban Water,

in the County of Down, to Randalstown in the County of Antrim.

An Act for the further explaining and amending an Act, intituled, An Act to prevent the Disorders that may happen by the marching of Soldiers, and for providing Carriages for the Baggage of Soldiers in their March.

An Act for directing the Application of the Sum of 7000 l. granted to the Dublin Society for the Encouragement of such Trades and Manufactures as should be directed by Parliament.

An Act for allowing further Time to Persons in Offices or Employments to qualify themselves, pursuant to an Act, intituled, An Act to prevent the further Growth of Popery.

An Act to enable Grand Juries to raise, by Presentment, Money for discharging the Rents of Court-houses, Goals, and Offices for keeping the Records of the respective Counties; and for other Purposes.

An Act for erecting New Chapels of Ease in the Parish of Armagh, and making such Chapels, and those that are already erected in the said Parish, perpetual Cures; and for making a proper Provision for the Maintenance of perpetual Curates to officiate in the same.
