Westminster, May 21. HIS Day, the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molineux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that The Lords, authorized by Virtue of His Majesty's Commission, for declaring His Royal Affent to several Asis agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, impowering the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, the Duke of Northum-berland, Lord Weymouth, Lord Lovel and Holland, Lord Harwich, and several other Lords therein mentioned, to declare and notify the Royal Affent to the faid Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Affent given to,

An Ast for further continuing certain Laws to prohibit, for a limited Time, the Exportation of Corn, Grain, Meal, Malt, Flour, Bread, Biscuit, and Starch; and also the Extraction of Low Wines and Spirits from Wheat and Wheat-Flour; for further allowing the Importation of Wheat and Wheat Flour, Barley, Barley-Meal, and Pulfe, free of Duty, into this Kingdom, from any Part of Europe; and for allowing the Importation of Oats, and Oat-Meal, Rye, and Rye-Meal, into this Kingdom, for a limited Time, free of Duty; and also for continuing such other Laws as will expire before the Beginning of the next Seffion of Par-

liament.

And to One Private Bill.

Dublin Castle, May 12. HIS Day his Excellency the Lord Lieute-I nant went in State to the House of Peers, and being seated on the Throne with the usual Ceremony, his Excellency fent for the Commons, and gave the Royal Affent to the following Bills;

An Act to amend and explain an Act paffed in the Ninth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intitled, An Act for the Relief of Insolvent Deb-

An All to continue, amend, and make more effectual, an All passed in the Fourth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the First, intitled, An Act for vesting in His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, the several Lands, Tenements, and Hereditaments, whereon the Barracks

in this Kingdom are built, or building, or contracted for, and whereon Light-Houses are or shall be ted for, and whereon Light-Houses are or shall be built; and for making reasonable Satisfaction to the several Owners and Proprietors for the same: And also an Act passed in the 21st Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the Seconds intitled, An Act for amending and making more effectual the said sormer Act: And likewise to enable the present Commissioners of the Barrack-Roard and their Successort to sell the several Board, and their Successors, to sell the several Estates in the Lands whereon Barracks have been built, that are now gone to Decay, or shall hereaster become useless, and also to sell the Materials of such decayed Barracks.

An AEt for making and repairing the Road from the Town of Listowell in the County of Kerry, through the Lands of Listowell, Drumin, Skehanireen, Bunegarah, Killmeany, Gurraphlolig, Knockenure, Lissensky, and Binanaspig, in the County of Kerry, Atea Taunpleatlea, Glandutt nagour, Knockfinish, Carrigkeery, Glanduss, Glannastare, Ballyline, Ardagh Commons, Ardagh Town, Lishitleen, otherwise Lishireen, Skebana, Killscannell, and Reens, in the County of Limerick, ending at the Forge on the faid Lands of Reens, at the Turn of the Road leading to Newcastle from Rathkeale in the said County of Limerick.
