**L**AST Night the Body of her late Royal Highness Princess Louisa-Anne was privately interred in the Royal Family Vault in King Henry the Seventh's Chapel at Westminster. The Proceffion was from the Princes Chamber, through the Old Palace-yard, to the South-East Door of Westminster Abbey, upon a Floor covered with Black, and lined on each Side with Foot-Guards, in the following Order :

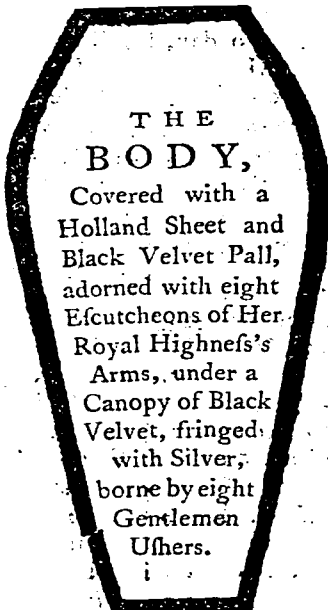

At the Entrance of Westminster Abbey, within the Church, the Dean and Prebends, attended by the Choir, received the Body, falling into the Procession, and so proceeded into King Henry the Seventh's Chapel, where the Body was placed on Tressels, the Chief Mourner and her Supporters sitting at the Head of the Corpse. The Part of the Service before the Interment being read, the Corpse was deposited in the Vault; and the Dean having finished the Burial-Service, Garter King of Arms proclaimed her Royal Highness's Stile as follows:

Thus it hath pleased Almighty God to take out of this transitory Life unto His Divine Mercy, the late most Illustrious Princess **LOUISA-ANNE**, third Daughter of the late most Illustrious Prince, **FREDERICK** Prince of Wales, deceased, and Sister of His most Excellent Majesty **GEORGE** the Third, by the Grace of God, King of Great-Britain, France, and Ireland, Defender of the Faith; Whom God bless and preserve with long Life, Health, and Honour, and all Worldly Happiness.

*Copenhagen, May 14.* A Messenger arrived here on Thursday last from Sleswick, with an Account of His Danish Majesty's having got there on Monday the 9th Instant: M. de Bernstorff, and the rest of his Retinue, arrived on the 11th.

*Dresden, May 15.* The Fair of Leipzig, which is now over, has proved this Season much better than for these three Years past.

On the 25th Instant the Court will retire to Pilsnitz, a Country Palace belonging to the Elector, seated on the Elbe, about four Leagues distant from hence.

*Hague, May 20.* The States of Holland are separated: They have issued a Placart to prohibit the putting any Stamp for the future upon Utensils made of what is called French Plate, or Argent-haché; and the vending, after the Term of three Months, any thing made of that Composition, and stampd. All such Utensils thus stampd, and made for Sale, being ordered to be exported after that Term, to put a Stop to Frauds in that Branch of Trade.

The Reviews of this Garrison ended To-day, after continuing three Days. All the Manœuvres were executed in the greatest Perfection, and highly to the Satisfaction of the Prince Stadtholder, a great Number of a General Officers, and a great Croud of Spectators. The several Corps did Honour to their Chiefs, being extremely well appointed, and very perfect in their Discipline.

The Prince of Orange has declared his Intention of setting out next Tuesday, on his Progress to North Holland, Amsterdam, &c. with the Princess his Consort. The Preparations making for their Reception at Amsterdam are immense. To-morrow Evening the Princess is to have a Drawing-Room in the Palace called the Old Court, to give the Nobility and Gentry an Opportunity of taking Leave of her Royal Highness.

M. Schryver, Lieutenant-Admiral of the Republic's Fleets, died a few Days ago at Amsterdam; and Vice-Admiral Vander Waayen is

appointed to succeed him in the Department of Amsterdam. Vice-Admiral Wassenaer is at the same Time appointed Lieutenant-Admiral of the Department of the Maese.

Incendiary Paper, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually wrote the same) who shall discover his, her, or their Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
