

Whitehall, May 24, 1768.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That on Friday or Saturday Morning last, an Incendiary Paper was fixed upon the Sign Post at the White Lion, in Tenterden in the County of Kent, (and many more of the like Purport on the Sign Posts, and Church Doors of several of the neighbouring Parishes) containing the Words following:

"this is to give notice to all gentlemen Farmers that have wheat and will not sell it for 10 pound a load to the mellers or poore people from this Day Forward on the 30 day of May will Have it without Money or price and that meller ho give a bove 10 Pound a Load shall shourly have his mill nocked down all poore men are desired to meet at woodchurch green on 30 day of May to raise a mob and whosoever refuses to come shall hav his writ Arme broke.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned in Writing and Fixing up the said Incendiary Paper, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon, to any one of them, (except the Person who actually wrote the same) who shall discover his, her, or their Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a farther Encouragement for the Discovery and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned therein, the Mayor and Jurats of the Town and Hundred of Tenterden in the said County of Kent, do hereby promise a Reward of Twenty Pounds to any of the Offenders, (except as before excepted) who shall discover his, her, or their Accomplice or Accomplices; to be paid by William Finch, Town-Clerk, upon the Conviction of any one or more of them.

His late Majesty having been graciously pleased, by his Warrant under his Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th of June, 1733; to establish certain Rules and Orders for the Relief of Poor Widows of Commission and Warrant Officers of the Royal Navy: These are to give Notice, that Copies of the said Rules and Orders are lodged with the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy at Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth; as also with the Clerks of the Cheque at Deptford, Woolwich, and Sheerneys; and with the Naval Officers at Harwich, Deal, and Kinsale; where all such Widows as intend to lay in their Claims, may be informed of all Particulars which entitle them to the Benefit of the said Charity, and receive the proper Certificates for that Purpose. But such Widows as live at too great a Distance from the Places above-mentioned, may apply by Letter to Mr. Bilson, at the Admiralty-Office, who will send them all necessary Information. And the Governors of the said Charity intending to distribute to the Widows of Sea-Officers who died before the 30th of August, 1732, as well as to the Widows of those who died since that Time, whose Circumstances come within the Rules of the Establishment, such Monies as may be due to them on the 31st of May instant; This is to give Notice, that any Widows who have not yet applied, and intend to lay in their Claims, may do so as soon as possible; and

that all such Widows, whose Claims have been already allowed, may send or bring to this Office, as soon as possible, the Affidavits required by the Rules, in order to their being continued upon the Pension or Bounty.
