Lisbon, May 14.

YESTERDAY being the Birth-day of the Infant Don Joseph, youngest Son of their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Brazil, their most Faithful Majesties, and the Royal Family, received the Compliments of the Nobility and Gentry at the Palace of Ajuda, on the Occasion.

Stockholm, May 17. The King of Sweden's Birth-day was celebrated at Dronningholm last Saturday: In the Evening there was a Comedy; and after that was over, all the Foreign Ministers were invited to sup with their Majesties and the Royal Family.

Copenhagen, May 24. The Queen Mother removed to her Palace of Hirschholm on Thursday last; the Queen Dowager and Prince Frederick to that of Friedensbourg on Friday, where they propose passing the Summer.

Berlin, May 28. Last Sunday the 22d and Monday the 23d, the Troops manœuvred before the King of Prussia; and on Tuesday Morning very early, the different Regiments that assisted at the Reviews and Manœuvres here, marched back to their respective Garrisons. The same Day the King of Prussia sat out for Custrin, Stargardt, Stettin, &c. where he reviewed several Regiments assembled at those Places; and he is expected this Night or To-morrow at Potsdam.

Hamburgh, May 30. A Proclamation has been published at Gottorp, dated the 14th of May, to take off the Duty hitherto laid upon Salt imported into Denmark. This Revenue is to be replaced by a Capitation of Two-Pence, to be levied Quarterly on every Person of Twelve Years of Age and upwards; and to be paid by the Masters of Families for their Children and Servants.

" Sir I have sent you this to let you know my mind, that as you could have prevented the Act, being past, for the paving of Portsmouth, & did not: but on the contrary Us'd your power to bring it to pass. If you do not use your power now to put a Stop to its execution. I give you my word that when I see the paving is begun I'll sur'ly Set on fire all your possessions in this Town. So will I to all of the first Committee who form'd the Act. if they do not postpone it for a few years or lay it wholly a side. And let them Collect Mony to Reimburse them Selves, as soon as they can. So if you, nor they Regard me not you Shall surely find come to pass what I have Said a bove. I have very Capable hand to do the Work"

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the Writing and Sending the said anonymous threatening Letter to the said John Carter, Esq; at Portsmouth, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually wrote the said Letter) who shall discover his, her, or their Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
