Antigua, April 22, 1768. Those Negroes that attended within Doors, were to have secured the Swords of the Gentlemen; and upon a Signal given, those that were without, were to fire into the Room, and put every Man to Death, as he endeavoured to escape. Savages had cast Lots for the Ladies, who they intended to carry off the Island to Porto Rico in the Ships which then lay in the Harbour, and were to have been secured upon the same Signal. The Conspiracy was discovered but a sew Days before it was to have been carried into Execution, by a Woman who overheard two of the Conspirators disputing about the Disposition of their Arms, and whose Evidence was scarcely credited, as she was much in Liquor when she gave it. Five of these Wretches have been already executed, and many more must suffer the same
