St. James's, June 25.

LAST Thursday being appointed for the Celebration of His Majesty's Birth-Day, there was a very numerous and splendid Appearance of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, to compliment Their Majesties on the Occasion. At One o'Clock the Guns in the Park and at the Tower were fired: In the Evening there was a Ball at Court; and Bon-fires, Illuminations, and all other publick Demonstrations of Joy, throughout London and Westminster.

Petersburg, May 28. The Countess Anna Petrowna Scheremetow died this Morning at Five o'Clock of the Small Pox.

Naples, May 31. Her Sicilian Majesty, who had been slightly indisposed for a few Days, being perfectly recovered, their Majesties received Yesterday the Compliments of the Nobility, &c. who had the Honour of kissing their Hands. Their Majesties afterwards dined in Publick; and at Night there was a grand Concert of Musick at the Palace.

The Great Duke and Dutchess have been pleased to honour Mr. Hamilton, His Britannick Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary at this Court, with their Company at Dinner.

Florence, June 4. The Ladies of Honour, and the Gentlemen, who attended the Queen of Naples to the Confiner of that Kingdom, returned to this Place last Week, and sat out Yesterday towards Vienna.

Berlin, June 14. Her Royal Highness the Princess of Prussia had been for some Days past a little indisposed; and Yesterday Morning some Symptoms of the Measles appeared, which seem to be of a favourable Kind, so that no Danger is apprehended.

Dresden, June 15. Sunday last, being the Eve of the Electress Dowager's Name-Day, the Foreign Ministers, and such of the Nobility and Strangers of Distinction who happened to be here, went in the Afternoon to Pilnitz, to compliment her Royal Highness on the Occasion. The following Day the whole Electoral Family retired with their Attendants to Seidlitz, a Seat belonging to the Elector, higher up the Elbe, in order to celebrate the Day.

Count Zinzendorff set out from hence the Day before Yesterday for Stockholm, where he is to reside as Envoy Extraordinary from Saxony.

Hague, June 21. The States of Holland are to assemble the 6th of July; and the Prince of Orange is expected here a few Days after. By the last Accounts from Loo, the Prince Stadholder, his Royal Consort, and Prince Lewis of Brunwick, continued in perfect Health, and are gone to Nymwegen to review the Troops, and see that Part of the Country. The Prince and Princess of Weillbourg intend to set out for Loos To-morrow.

General Post Office, June 25, 1768.

His Majesty's Postmaster General, for the further Improvement of Correspondence, intending to establish a Post Six Times a Week, instead of Three as at present, between England and Ireland, both by the Way of Holbaird and Port Patrick, the several Regulations for that Purpose will commence on Wednesday the 6th of July next.

From that Time also the Letters between several Parts of England and Ireland, which have hitherto been sent through London, will be circulated directly through the Bye and Cross Roads; by which Means the Correspondence between many Commercial Parts in both Kingdoms will be greatly accelerated.

Notwithstanding the frequent Regulations and Improvements made by the Postmaster General for the Benefit of Correspondence in divers Parts of Great-Britain and Ireland, it still appears, that vast Numbers of Letters are privately collected and delivered contrary to Law, to the great Prejudice of the Revenue: Public Notice is therefore hereby given, That all Carriers, Coachmen, Watermen, Dispensers of Country News-Papers, Higlers, and all others whatsoever, hereafter detected in the illegal collecting, conveying, or delivering of Letters or Packets, will be prosecuted with the utmost Severity.

The Penalty is Five Pounds for every several Offence, and One Hundred Pounds every Week such Practice is continued: One Moiety to the King, and the other Moiety to such Person or Persons who shall inform against the Offender or Offenders.
