IT having been represented to His Majesty,
that several Persons, who have obtained Or-
ders of His Majesty in Council for Grants of
Land in His Majesty's Island of St. John in
North America, have neglected to take out such
Orders, or, if taken out, to present them to
His Majesty's Governor of Nova Scotia, by
Means whereof His Majesty's Gracious Inten-
tions, with Respect to the Settlement of that
Island, may be defeated, and the Cultivation and
Improvement thereof greatly obstructed and re-
tarded; It is therefore this Day ordered by His
Majesty in Council, that the Governor, or
Commander in Chief for the Time being, of His
Majesty's Colony of Nova Scotia, do forbear to
pass any Grants, under the Seal of that Colony,
of any Lots or Parcels of Land in His Majes-
ties said Island of St. John, unless His Majesty's
Order in Council, directing the same, shall have
been produced to him on or before the first Day
of May, which shall be in the Year 1769: And
that this His Majesty's Order in Council be pub-
lished in the London Gazette, to the End that
all Persons concerned may have due Notice
thereof.

Stockholm, June 10. The King of Sweden
is perfectly recovered of the Bruises he received
by his Fall: Publick Thanks are ordered to be
returned in all the Churches of this City; and
9000 Dollars to be given to the Person who stopt
the Horses. The Court is gone into Mourning
for a Month, on the Death of her late Royal
Highness the Princess Louisa Anne, the King
Great Britain's Sister.

Vienna, June 15. The Emperor, the Duke
of Saxe-Teschen, and all the Persons of their
Retinue, arrived here last Thursday Morning, in
perfect Health. The Court removed last Mon-

day from Schonbrunn to Laxemburg for a Fort-
night.

Paris, June 25. Last Night, about Ten
o'Clock, her most Christian Majesty departed
this Life. The King went immediately to Mar-
ly. It is expected the Court will soon go to
Compeign for the Summer Season.

Hague, June 24. His Serene Highness the
Prince Stadtholder is returned from Nimeguen
and Arnheim to Loo, with Prince Lewis of
Brunswick; at which Places he reviewed the
Garrisons, together with those of Grave, &c.
among which are the two new Battalions of
Orange Nassau, and those of Wald-ck; lately
arrived from Germany. The last Advices of
the King of Prussia's Journey, mention his Ar-
rival at Brunswick. The Princess, Consort in
the Prince Royal of Prussia, has been extremely
ill of the Meazles, but we hear the Eruption had
at last appeared, and her Royal Highness was
hoped to be out of Danger.

Hague, June 28. The King of Denmark
was expected at Loo on Sunday last at Din-
ner, but did not reach Nimeguen till Five
o'Clock; his Majesty passed the Night there,
and came to Loo Yesterday between One and
Two o'Clock; where the Prince of Orange,
the Prince of Weilbourg, and Duke Lewis of Bruns-
wick, received him at the Foot of the Staircase;
the Princess of Orange, and Princess of Weil-
bourg, were at the Top, and walked into the
Apartments with him: Dinner was soon after
served up; and about Five o'Clock, his Danish
Majesty set out for Utrecht. It is said that he
will spend Two Days there, and go from thence
to Amsterdam, and North Holland, and then by
Harrlem; and Leyden to the Hague. His Ma-
jesty was attended only by M. Bernsdorff, the
Counts Holke and Moltke, and Baron Schim-
melman; the Rest of the King's Retinue took
the Route from Nimeguen to Utrecht and Am-
sterdam.

I will reimburse to all Private Persons the Amount of such Losses, proved before the Governor and Council, as they may sustain in their Trade in the Country: If I should not be able to discharge this in ready Money, I will give Assignments of Land for the Amount. Of which Sum Three-Fourths were paid by the Nabobs, Part by Meer Jaffer before his Death, and Part by his Successors, when the Revenues, from whence the other Payments were to arise, fell into the Possession of the East-India Company.

"Therefore that it be Resolved, that Orders be forthwith sent to the Governor and Council of Bengal, for the immediate Payment, out of the Revenues of Bengal, Bahar, and Orissa, of what remains unpaid of the said Restitution Money, to the several Persons to whom it is due, according to their Claims, as admitted and liquidated by the Committee formerly appointed by the Governor and Council for that Purpose, whether such Claims are found to arise from Losses in Trade of Salt, Beetle Nut, or Tobacco, (which the Court of Directors have at this Court represented to be, in their Opinions, and also in the Opinion of their Council, Illicit Trades, and repugnant to the Covenants entered into with the Company by their Servants) or not."

General Post Office, June 25, 1768.

His Majesty's Postmaster General, for the further Improvement of Correspondence, intending to establish a Post Six Times a Week, instead of Three as at present, between England and Ireland, both by the Way of Holyhead and Port Patrick, the several Regulations for that Purpose will commence on Wednesday the 6th of July next.

From that Time also the Letters between several Parts of England and Ireland, which have hitherto been sent through London, will be circulated directly through the Bye and Cross Roads; by which Means the Correspondence between many Commercial Parts in both Kingdoms will be greatly accelerated.

Notwithstanding the frequent Regulations and Improvements made by the Postmaster General for the Benefit of Correspondence in divers Parts of Great-Britain and Ireland, it still appears, that vast Numbers of Letters are privately collected and delivered contrary to Law, to the great Prejudice of the Revenue: Public Notice is therefore hereby given, That all Carriers, Coachmen, Watermen, Dispensers of Country News-Papers, Higlers, and all others whatsoever, hereafter detected in the illegal collecting, conveying, or delivering of Letters or Packets, will be prosecuted with the utmost Severity.

The Penalty is Five Pounds for every several Offence, and One Hundred Pounds every Week for Practice is continued: One Moiety to the King, and

the other Moiety to such Person or Persons who shall inform against the Offender or Offenders.
