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*Naples, June 14.*

**O**N Sunday last Count Kaunitz, by Order of the Empress Queen, gave a most magnificent Ball, after having distributed to the Populace 40000 Silver Coins of her Sicilian Majesty, about the Size of Shillings and Sixpences. The Great Duke of Tuscany was present at this Donation, and the Money was thrown by Count Kaunitz and her Royal Highness's Attendants. The Great Duchesse having been slightly indisposed, was not at Count Kaunitz's Entertainment. On Wednesday Count Kaunitz likewise, by Order of the Empress, gives a masked Ball; and, on Sunday next, M. Clemente, the Spanish Minister, by Order of his Catholic Majesty, will give a Concert and Ball to the Nobility, and a Cuccagna to the Populace.

*Stockholm, June 17.* During the Exercise at the Camp last Wednesday, Prince Frederick received a slight Wound in his Foot by a Soldier's Bayonet falling upon it; which obliged his Royal Highness to leave the Camp, and to return to Dronningholm.

*Berlin, June 25* Her Royal Highness the Princess of Prussia is so well recovered, that she went Yesterday to Potsdam.

Princess Ferdinand of Prussia having been for some Time indisposed, the Physicians have advised the Use of the Baths of Aix la Chapelle; and accordingly his Royal Highness Prince Ferdinand, and the Princess, sat out for that Place on the 18th Instant.

The King of Prussia, accompanied by the Prince Royal, arrived on the 20th, in perfect Health, at Potsdam.

*Hague, July 1.* The King of Denmark arrived at Utrecht in the Night between Monday and Tuesday last: His Majesty declined the Honours offered him, and the Deputation of the States of that Province, which waited on him on Tuesday Morning, but was pleased to receive the Gentlemen who composed it, on the Footing of a private Visit, and to admit them to the Honour of Dining with him. His Majesty went on Wednesday to Amsterdam by Water, and has signified his Intention of going to the Hague on the 4th Instant. Baron de Choüffes has notified to the Ministers of the States his Majesty's earnest Desire to remain incognito, and to be treated as a private Gentleman.

The Prince of Orange has been at Zutphen to review the Garrison, and was by the last Accounts returned to Loo, in good Health. His Serene Highness is expected here on the 11th.

Yesterday being the Day appointed for celebrating the Anniversary of His Majesty's Birth-Day, the Great Guns in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix were fired, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks. At Noon there was a splendid Appearance of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction at the Castle, to compliment his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant, before whom an Ode; set to Music, was performed. In the Evening a Play was given by his Excellency to the Ladies; and at Night there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy.

General Post Office, June 25, 1768.

His Majesty's Postmaster General, for the further Improvement of Correspondence, intending to establish a Post Six Times a Week, instead of Three as at present, between England and Ireland, both by the Way of Holyhead and Port Patrick, the several Regulations for that Purpose will commence on Wednesday the 6th of July next.

From that Time also the Letters between several Parts of England and Ireland, which have hitherto been sent through London, will be circulated directly through the Bye and Cross Roads; by which Means the Correspondence between many Commercial Parts in both Kingdoms will be greatly accelerated.

Notwithstanding the frequent Regulations and Improvements made by the Postmaster General for the Benefit of Correspondence in divers Parts of Great-Britain and Ireland, it still appears, that vast Numbers of Letters are privately collected and delivered contrary to Law, to the great Prejudice of the Revenue: Public Notice is therefore hereby given; That all Carriers, Coachmen, Watermen, Dispersers of Country News-Papers, Higlers, and all others whatsoever, hereafter detected in the illegal collecting, conveying, or delivering of Letters or Packets, will be prosecuted with the utmost Severity.

The Penalty is Five Pounds for every several Offence, and One Hundred Pounds every Week such Practice is continued: One Moiety to the King, and the other Moiety to such Person or Persons who shall inform against the Offender or Offenders.
