Madrid, June 23.

HIS Catholick Majesty reviewed lately, on a Plain in the Neighbourhood of Aranjuez near Ocana, the Regiment of Carabineers, commanded by the Duke of Huesca. The King, the Prince of Asturias, Don Gabriel, and Don Lewis, were on Horseback; the Princess of Asturias, and the other Infants, were under a Tent. As soon as the Review was over, his Catholic Majesty promoted Six of the oldest Private Men to the Rank of Officers.

Florence, June 25. Yesterday being the Festival of St. John, the Tutelar Saint of Florence, on which the Homage of the Subaltern Towns and Fiefs is every Year renewed to the Great Duke, his Royal Highness deputed M. Neri, the Principal Member of the Council, to represent his Person on this Occasion; and every Thing passed as usual.

Brussels, July 1. Last Night died here Comte de Bournonville, General of Cavalry, Governor of Charleroy, and Commander in Chief of the Austrian Troops in this Country. As he was always a warm Friend to the Officer and the Soldier, his Death is very much regretted by the Military.

Brussels, July 5. Yesterday died suddenly, whilst he was at Dinner, M. Van Haren, Minister Plenipotentiary from the States General to this Court.
