A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS His Majesty's Writs have been issued for calling a Parliament to meet and to be holden at the City of Dublin on Monday the First Day of August next: And whereas His Majesty hath thought fit to signify His Royal Pleasure, that the Meeting of the said Parliament be put off until Tuesday the Sixth Day of September following;

We do therefore hereby publish and declare, That the said Parliament be prorogued, and the same is hereby prorogued to Tuesday the Sixth Day of September next; and the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses are discharged of their Attendance on Monday the First Day of August next, and required to attend on Tuesday the Sixth Day of September following accordingly.

GOD Save the KING.

AT the Court at *St. James's*, the 29th Day of *June*, 1768,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

IT having been represented to His Majesty, that several Persons, who have obtained Orders of His Majesty in Council for Grants of Land in His Majesty's Island of St. John in North America, have neglected to take out such Orders, or, if taken out, to present them to His Majesty's Governor of Nova Scotia, by Means whereof His Majesty's Gracious Intentions, with Respect to the Settlement of that Island, may be defeated, and the Cultivation and Improvement thereof greatly obstructed and retarded; It is therefore this Day ordered by His Majesty in Council, that the Governor, or Commander in Chief for the Time being, of His

Majesty's Colony of Nova Scotia, do forbear to pass any Grants, under the Seal of that Colony, of any Lots or Parcels of Land in His Majesty's said Island of St. John, unless His Majesty's Order in Council, directing the same, shall have been produced to him on or before the first Day of May, which shall be in the Year 1769: And that this His Majesty's Order in Council be published in the London Gazette, to the End that all Persons concerned may have due Notice thereof.

Vienna, July 6. The Empress Queen goes To-morrow to Schloß-Hoff, where she will spend a few Days with the Duke and Dutchess of Saxe-Teichen.

A considerable Part of the Army being to form several small Camps this Summer, his Imperial Majesty will make a Tour to visit them. It is said he will go to Stiria about the Middle of this Month for that Purpose; and into Moravia and Bohemia the Beginning of August.

Hague, July 19. Count Hompesch, one of the Nobles of Holland, is appointed to succeed the late Count Bentinck de Varel as High Bailiff of Woerden.

The King of Denmark continues his Abode at the Hague till next Thursday. His Danish Majesty has been entertained by the Prince of Orange, Duke Lewis of Brunwick, and last Night he was at the Abby of Leuwenhorst, one of the Piefs of this Province, situate about five Leagues from hence, and possessed by Baron de Boetzlaer, where there was a splendid Ball and Supper, which the Princes and Princesses of Orange and Nassau-Weilbourg honoured with their Presence. To-day his Majesty dined at the Imperial Minister's.
