Vienna, August 10.

ON Sunday Evening the Empress had a very alarming Accident, but which happily will be attended with no bad Consequence. She was going to take the Air in a small open Chaise in the Park of Schloßhoff, and just as she had got into the Chaise, and was going to seat herself, the Horses gave a sudden Start, and her Imperial Majesty fell out of the Chaise upon her Face, which is much bruised. She removed the next Day to Schonbrun. The Contusion is violent and painful, and her Face is much swelled; but she is in other Respects perfectly well, has not the least Fever, and is able to walk about in her Room, and to do Business with her Ministers as usual.

His Highness Prince George of Mecklenbourg arrived here on Monday last in perfect Health.

Vienna, August 17. The Empress continues well, and is able to go Abroad; but as her Face is much bruised, it will be some Time before she will appear in Publick.

The Emperor will set out on Friday next to visit the Camps in Bohemia and Moravia, and will be absent about Six Weeks.

Berlin, August 20. His Prussian Majesty is so well recovered from his late Fit of the Gout, that he will set out next Monday for Silesia, and return to Pozdam about the Middle of September.

Hague, August 26. The Prince and Princess of Orange accompanied Prince Henry of Prussia Yesterday to Leyden, where their Highnesses examined every Thing remarkable in that University; and, after having been entertained at Dinner, returned here in the Evening.

The King has been pleased to appoint the Honourable Robert Walpole to be Secretary to the Extraordinary Embassy to his Most Christian Majesty.

Whitehall, August 27, 1768.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to His Majesty, that on Tuesday Evening last, August the 23d, a Body of Sailors, to the Number of 500 or 600, being riotously and tumultuously assembled, came down to Limchouse, and then sent off Ten of their Number in a Boat to the Ship Middleton, Henry Clark, Commander, having Filens on Board, sentenced to be transported to His Majesty's Plantations in America; which said Ten Persons forcibly boarded and entered the said Ship.

Ship, declaring they would hinder her proceeding on her Voyage, as also every other outward-bound Vessel in the River Thames, unless their Masters entered into Articles with their Men for advanced Wages; and for this Purpose carried away the Chief Mate of the said Ship against his Will, and at the same Time extorted Money from the Master of the said Ship, for their Boat-Hire, by threatening to strip the Ship of all her Rigging, and to turn the Felons on Shore: His Majesty, for the Discovery of the Offenders in this most daring Insult on His Government, and in order to bring them to Justice, is pleased hereby to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of the said Ten Persons, who shall make Discovery of one or more of his Accomplices, so that he or they be convicted of the said Offence; and, as a further Encouragement, His Majesty is pleased to promise to any Person who shall discover one or more of the said Offenders, a Reward of FIFTY POUNDS, to be paid on Conviction by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury.

And whereas Information has been given, that, on the same Evening, and the Morning following, divers other Ships in the River Thames were likewise forcibly boarded, and several of their Men carried away by Violence, under the same Pretence of not suffering the Ships to sail till the Seamen's Wages are increased: His Majesty is pleased, in like Manner, for the Discovery of the said Offenders, to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of the Accomplices therein, and a Reward of TWENTY POUNDS, to any Person who shall make such Discovery; to be paid, in the like Manner, on Conviction of them, or any of them.

Whereas it hath been humbly represented to the King, That notwithstanding the well-adapted Plan, which the Manufacturers in Spitalfields are vigorously pursuing for the Benefit of the Journeymen in every Branch of the Manufactory, yet a great Number of evil-disposed Persons, armed with Pistols, Cutlasses, and other offensive Weapons, and in Disguise, assembled themselves together about the Hour of Twelve in the Night of the 20th Day of August Instant, and forcibly entered into the Dwelling-House of Nathaniel Farr, a Journeyman Weaver, situate in Pratts Alley near Spitalfields aforesaid, and cut to Pieces and destroyed the Silk-Works then manufacturing in Two different Looms there, belonging to Mess. Phipps and Ewerard, of Primrose-Street; and also forcibly broke open and entered the Dwelling-House of Elizabeth Pratt in the same Alley, and then and there feloniously and maliciously murdered one Edward Fitchet, a Lad of about Seventeen Years of Age, by wilfully Shooting him through the Head with a Pistol, which was loaded with several square cut Pieces of Lead or Pewter, and several Times fired at another Person in the said last-mentioned House: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said several Outrages and Murder, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one or more of them, (except the Person who actually committed the said Murder) who shall discover his, her, or their Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
