Dublin, September 13.

ON Sunday September the 4th, his Grace John Duke of Beauford, Chancellor of the University, landed in Dublin, and was conducted to his Apartments in the House of the Right Honourable the Provost of Trinity College, where the Fellows and Professors attended to congratulate his Grace on his Arrival.

Friday September the 9th, being the Day appointed for the Installation of his Grace, the necessary Orders were issued, and the Great Hall of Trinity College prepared and decorated for the Solemnity.

On the East End a grand Platform was erected, covered with green Cloth and rich Carpeting, and separated from the lower Area by an elegant Ballustrade; at the Extremity of which, directly, fronting the Great Door, his Grace the Chancellor's Chair of State was placed in an Alcove adorned with a rich Canopy of Silk Damask. On the Right Side of the Platform were placed Chairs of State for his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant and Lady Townshend: The lower Part of the Hall was formed into a Theatre for the Reception of Ladies and Students of the several Orders; and on the West End was erected, over the Great Door, a magnificent Orchestra, in which was placed a full Band of vocal and instrumental Performers.

At Twelve o'Clock his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant and Lady Townshend entered the Hall through a full and brilliant Assembly of Ladies, preceded by the Lord High Chancellor of Ireland with the Purse, and attended by their Officers of State.

As soon as the Lord Lieutenant and Lady Townshend had taken their Seats, the Procession of the University advanced from the Regent-Room to the Hall, through a numerous Crowd of Spectators, in the following Order: Under Graduates, Bachelors of Arts, Masters of Arts, Bachelors of Laws, Physic, and Divinity, in the Gowns and Hoods of their respective Orders; Doctors of Music, Laws, Physic, and Divinity, in the Habits of their Degrees; Students, Sons of Noblemen, viz. the Honourable Mr. Townshend, eldest Son of his Excellency the Lord

Lieutenant, and the Honourable Mr. Crosbie, eldest Son of Lord Branden; Senior Fellows of Trinity College; the Right Honourable Lord Viscount Clanwilliam, A. B. Earl of Mornington, Professor of Music; Earl of Lanesborough, Doctor of Laws; the Mace and Proctors. **THE CHANCELLOR**, supported by his Grace the Lord Primate and the Right Honourable the Provost, and attended by a numerous Train of Nobility, Bishops in their Robes, Privy-Councillors, Lord Mayor and High Sheriffs of the City of Dublin, and other Persons of Rank and Distinction, most of whom had formerly been Members of the University.

The several Orders of the University having arrived at their respective Seats, and the Senior Fellows, Noblemen and Sons of Noblemen, with the Doctors of several Faculties, being ranged on the Left Side of the Platform, his Grace advanced to the Foot of his Chair, where he stood while the Instrument of his Election was read, and then was conducted into his Chair by his Grace the Lord Primate, Vice-Chancellor, and the Provost, attended by the Body of Senior Fellows. The Provost then delivered to his Grace a Book of Statutes, grandly decorated, (while the Mace and other Insignia were laid before him) declaring his Investiture, in a short Latin Form, and, in the Name of the University, promising due Obedience to his Grace in the Office of Chancellor.

The Duke then rose and addressed himself to the Assembly, expressing his Sense of the Honour now conferred upon him, his sincere Attachment to the University and to the Kingdom, and his particular Acknowledgments to the Provost and Senior Fellows: The Elegance and Propriety with which his Grace's Sentiments were delivered made a very extraordinary Impression upon all his Hearers.

The Vice-Chancellor, Provost, and Senior Fellows having now retired to their Seats, and the whole Assembly being seated, the Provost rose in his Place, and delivered the Installation Speech in Latin, which was heard with profound Attention, and received with an uncommon and justly merited Applause.

This was succeeded by the Performance of an Ode set to Musick by the Earl of Mornington, whose extraordinary Talents were most eminently displayed on this Occasion.

His Grace the Chancellor then opened the COMITIA, and, after a short Speech in Latin by Dr. Wilder, Senior Proctor, the several Candidates for Degrees were presented and admitted, viz. Four Doctors of Divinity, two Doctors of Physick, three Doctors of Laws, one Doctor of Musick, three Masters of Arts, one Batchelor of Arts, and one Batchelor of Musick.

His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant and Lady Townshend then retired with the Officers and Nobility that attended them: After which the Procession of the University returned in Order to the Provost's House.

His Excellency, together with the Nobility and Gentry who had attended the Solemnity, were entertained at Dinner in the New Hall by his Grace the Chancellor, Provost and Fellows. The whole Ceremonial of the Day was conducted without the least Disorder, and the Younger Students received Public Thanks from the Provost and Senior Fellows for the Decency and Propriety of their Behaviour.

On Sunday the 11th Instant, his Grace took his Seat in the Chapel, and attended Divine Service. A Te Deum, Jubilate, and two Anthems, composed by the Right Honorable the Professor of Musick, were performed by the Gentlemen of the Choirs of Christ-Church and St. Patrick, and an excellent Sermon, adapted to the Occasion, was preached by the Rev. Dr. Disney, Regius Professor of Divinity.

On Tuesday the 13th his Grace visited the Schools and other Parts of the University: In the Natural Philosophy School he was addressed by the Hon. Mr. Crosbie in a Copy of English Verses; and, being entertained for some Time by a Number of curious Experiments, he proceeded to the Library, where, having viewed the Books, Manuscripts, and Medals, Dr. Leland, Professor of Oratory, took Leave of his Grace in a short elegant English Speech, to which his Grace returned a most obliging Answer: His Grace has been pleased to express his entire Satisfaction with the Reception he has met with; and it is with the highest Pleasure the University observe the undeniable Proofs of Regard, Respect, and Veneration, which his Grace has received from all Ranks and Denominations of People.

Berlin, September 10. We learn from Breslaw, that the Marriage of his Serene Highness Prince Frederick of Brunswick with the Princess Frederica-Sophia-Charlot-Augusta, of Wurtemberg Oels, was celebrated on the 6th Instant.

His Majesty's Postmaster General having been pleased to establish a sufficient Number of Packet-Boats to sail between Falmouth and New York, Charles Town, and the West India Islands, to support a regular Monthly Correspondence to and from these Kingdoms and all Parts of His Majesty's extensive Dominions in America.

PUBLIC NOTICE is hereby given, that the several Mails for America, upon this New Arrangement, are to be made up at this Office on Wednesday the 5th of October next, and will continue to be dispatched from hence in the same Manner upon the first Wednesday in every Month.

The Mail for New York will contain the Letters for all the Provinces on the Continent of America, from Virginia Northwards. That for Charles Town will include the Letters for North and South Carolina, Georgia, and East Florida. The Letters for Pensacola and all Parts of West Florida will be forwarded from Jamaica by every Opportunity. The Mail for the West Indies will contain the Letters for Barbadoes, all the Leeward Islands, and Jamaica, from whence the Packet-Boats are, instead of proceeding to Pensacola, to return immediately to Falmouth.

Upon the Arrival of these several Mails from here at Falmouth, the Packet-Boats are to proceed with them to Sea immediately, Wind and Weather permitting; but if they should be unavoidably detained one or more Days, such Letters as come hither, or may be put into this Office, will be sent every Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday to Falmouth, for the Chance of the Packet under Sailing Orders, and if sailed, they will be forwarded by the next Boat in Turn.

Great Inconveniences having arisen to the Public by returning Letters for the Postage; Their Lordships, for the Accommodation of Correspondence, leave it now to the Option of the Writer to pay or not beforehand to any Part of His Majesty's Dominions either in Europe or America, except to Gibraltar or Port Major.

All Persons however are particularly to take Notice, that Letters and Packets from any Part of Great Britain, Ireland, or America, for all Places beyond the Seas not in His Majesty's Dominions, are to pay at the Office where they are put in, the full Port to London, besides the Foreign Rates they may be chargeable with, to prevent the Necessity of their being opened and returned for the Postage.
