HE Empress having been slightly indisposed on Sunday last, there was no Court, but her Imperial Majesty is now recovered, and come with the Grand Duke into the Winter-Palace for the Season.

Berlin, October 8. Two Days ago their Royal Highnesses Prince and Princess Ferdinand of Prussia arrived from Aix-la-Chapelle at their Country-Seat at Fredericksfeld; and last Thursday Count Verelst, Envoy from the States-General to this Court, returned to his Station from the Hague.

Whitehall, October 18.

On Friday last, about Noon, the King of Denmark embarked on board the Mary Yacht at Dover, with the Wind at East, for Calais.

On the Yacht's going out of the Harbour, his Danish Majesty was saluted by the Guns at the Castle, both the Forts, some Platforms of Guns crected near the Shore for that Purpose, and all those in the Harbour.

Hi Majesty had a fine Passage, and landed at Calais between Four and Five the same Afternoon.

HEREAS Information has been received from His Majesty's Minister at Paris, dated the 12th Instant, that on the 2d of Soptember last, the Schooner Resolution, of Philadelphia, John de la Harty (or O'Flaharty) Maiter, was wrecked off the Port of Granville in Normandy, when her Crew, consisting of Six Persons, got on Shore; and Part of the Cargo on Board was saved, and remains under the Care of the Officers of the Admiralty there. And whereas on Examination of the Captain, and the Mate Samuel Wilson, who, with the Rest of the Crew, are in Custody, there is strong Reason to believe that the said Ship has
